Privately Owned Timber

Gilbert D. Brown, Supervisor of the Fremont National Forest, returned to Lakeview Saturday evening from Klamath County where he had been the past several days securing statistics on the timber acreage in private ownership in that county. He reports that the official county census shows that Klamath has 9,612,595,000 feet board measure of merchantable timber in the county, in the hands of private owners. The valuation of this timber is estimated at approximately eight and one-half million dollars.

The privately owned timber in Lake County has never been cruised by the county, but is estimated at approximately 272,200 acres.

More Land to Open

A late news dispatch from Ficksburg says: Fifty thousand acres of unsurveyed land between here and Fort Rock will be thrown open to entry within a short time, according to word that has come from Congressman Sinnott at Washington, who states that the survey of the lands made nearly a year ago has been accepted by the department of the interior. When the plats are filed with the surveyor general, at Portland the land will be open to entry and settlement upon some date set by that official. The land is all in Lake County.

Youth Starts Fire

An incendiary blaze in its infancy was discovered in the woodshed near the Masonic building last Thursday evening by Marshal Whorton. Ernest Martin, a lad 14 years of age was found at the place and suspicion strongly pointed toward him as having started the fire. Leaving the young man by the shed while water to extinguish the flames was obtained, he took his departure, but was found and taken into custody the following morning. The boy was reprimanded before the juvenile court and placed under six months probation.
