MORE NAMES ADDED WANT SALT DEPOSITS

REGISTRATION TEA GIVEN SATURDAY WAS GREAT SUCCESS

HIG DEMAND FOR MINERALS IN LAKES OF THIS COUNTY

Ladies Civic Improvement Club Served Refreshments and Responsible For Increased Registration

New York Men Offer to Pay State for Deposits in Abert and Summer Lakes

Last Saturday afternoon the Ladies Civic Improvement Club gave a Registration Tea in the two rooms of the County School Superintendents office at the Court House.

Governor West has announced that another proposition has been presented to the State Land Board for taking the salt deposits from Abert and Summer Lakes. Jason C. Moore, trustee for a number of New York men, offers to pay the state \$1,000,000 at the rate of \$50,000 a year for the salt laden lakes.

Three tables were prepared and covered with dainty linen and decorated with beautiful flowers, choice silver and glassware and rare china sets. A committee consisting of Mesdames Vanderpool, Everett, Bieher, Kuhl, Rinehart and others prepared and served tea, coffee and cake to all who called at the Court House. During the afternoon scores of men and women partook of the refreshments and a large number of women were added to the registration list. Praise is due County Clerk Payne and his wife for the expeditious manner in which they handled the registrations.

C. M. Sain and associates now have a lease with the state covering these lakes, under which they were to pay the state royalties of not less than \$50,000 nor more than \$200,000 a year, but they have been unable to finance the project.

While the ladies have not been giving many public functions recently, their work one and two years ago was productive of much good to the public welfare, and this last meeting shows what may be done by fostering the get-together spirit. As the privilege of voting has been given to the women this meeting and others will be the means of conferring with each other and with the men and informing themselves upon the issues to be settled at elections in the future.

Governor West said on the face of the proposition from the New York people it did not look favorable to the state as nearly 100,000 acres are involved, which are worth fully \$1,000,000, and as the state gets six per cent interest for its money the \$50,000 a year offered by the New Yorkers would not even amount to usual interest on the capital involved.

The ladies are to be congratulated for the success of their first effort to get a full registration and to be thanked by all who enjoyed the refreshments.

The proposition will be taken up by the state land board for consideration.

U. S. FIGHTING STRENGTH COMPARED WITH MEXICO

Naval
The United States has 14 modern battleships or dreadnaughts and 5 more building, 25 older battleships, 5 first class cruisers, 15 third-class cruisers, 28 gunboats, 9 monitors, 62 torpedo boat destroyers, 27 troyedo boats, 50 submarines, 64,780 officers and men, including 7,526 in the Naval Militia.
Mexico boasts of 6 gunboats armed with four-inch guns, 2 destroyers, several transports and 1,200 officers and men.

Army
The Regular United States Army, enlisted strength, staff and line, numbers 84,859 men exclusive of the hospital corps and provisional force. There are 4,745 officers. The Militia consists of 113,279 actually enlisted men and 16,004,683 reserve militia subject to call of war.
The Mexican Government claims a standing army of 107,000 men, 6,326 officers and 49,000 men. Huerta has in the past asserted he could raise an army of 150,000 men. Mexico's national debt is \$219,324,264.

Representatives Smith and Forbes, with State Senator W. Lair Thompson of Lakeview, whose term does not expire until 1916, represented this district at the last Legislature.

They have all expressed themselves as highly pleased with the future here. If the Townsite Company complete their dam this year and get ready to deliver water the coming spring as seems to be the present plan, this country will be the best little spot in Oregon, as this move will bring increased population and increased land values for all.

A complaint was filed in Justice Court last week charging Bill Partin with assault and battery upon the person of W. H. Kendall. The assault occurred just north of Paisley upon the county road April 7th. Partin was arrested at the Jack Partin home on Summer Lake Monday of this week and brought to Paisley by Deputy Sheriff Keeder of Silver Lake. Dairy for Surprise Valley

Dr. W. H. Patterson of Surprise Valley, Modoc county, California, who is a guest at the Riverside, has recently made a deal by which he will lease his 2000 acre ranch to J. B. Bellati of Humboldt county, California, who will establish a mammoth dairying business on the property, says the Reno Gazette. The lease will run for 10 years, beginning November 1, 1914.

Three big barns for the cows will be built, the first one during the coming summer, this one to accommodate 200 cows. A creamery will also be constructed with a concrete floor and the most modern equipment in line with the demands of the California state dairy commission. This is to be operated by the dairyman and the doctor jointly, and a large influx of Swiss-Italian dairymen is expected on account of the enterprise.
