Colorado Hostilities Cease

Colonel James Lockett, commanding the Eleventh United States Cavalry, has arrived in Colorado and has taken supreme command of the strike situation in that state. A special session of the State Legislature was begun Monday, and while no agreement between the opposing factions have been entered into hostilities have ceased. One of the most important bills brought before the special session will, if passed, pay the expenses of the military campaign of the state militia and give the governor additional authority in times of internal strife.

Absolute responsibility for the fatal battle at Ludlow, Monday April 20, was placed upon the Greeks of the strikers colony at Ludlow, by the military board.

Roy Ramer Acquitted

Alturas Plaindealer: The Superior Court, Judge C. A. Raker presiding, convened promptly at 10 o'clock Monday for the trial of Roy Ramer, charged by indictment with the larceny of a horse. Practically all the jurors summoned answered roll call and no time was lost in drawing a jury. By 12M. a jury had been drawn and one witness examined and the case submitted at 4 o'clock p. m. The jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

It will be remembered that Ramer was arrested by Sheriff Snider and Deputy Arthur of Lake County a few weeks ago at Abert Lake, upon instructions from Sheriff Smith of Modoc County.

pate in the mediation negotiating, although the mediators further explained their position to General Carranza and are still hopeful that he might be represented. The American government has not yet chosen its representative.

Persistent reports continue to come from Mexico that General Huerta intends to retire from the provisional presidency on condition that he be assured a safe conduct to a port and placed on board a foreign warship, and the latest accounts from Vera Cruz give the rumor that quarters have been held for several days on board a foreign cruiser for some high Mexican official coming from the federal capital, presumably Huerta and General Blanquet or possibly both. It seems to be quite generally agreed that Huerta is rapidly laying his plans to flee.

There has been no serious fighting of late between the rebel and federal forces, although plans are said to be continuing for future movements. The report that Villa with his forces would immediately advance upon Mexico City, is denied in later dispatches which state that the rebel commander may not make his intended descent upon the capital before a lapse of another three months.

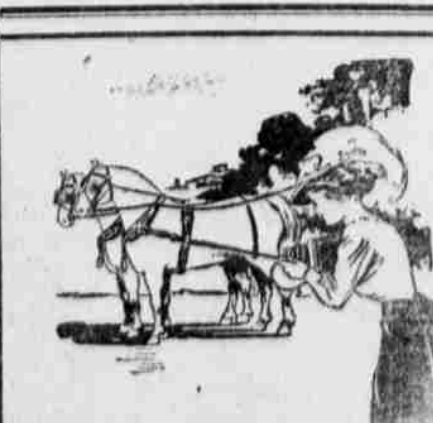
