DAYTON WINS; MYERS LOSES

Primary Elections Pass off Quietly in Crook County

OWING to the fact that three of the candidates of the primary election held last Friday live at Laidlaw, more than usual interest was taken in the results, which were very slow in coming in. The comonest question during the past week has been:

"Have you heard how the election stands? Did Myers win?" I heard that Dayton was successful.

But it was a question difficult to answer before the appearance of today's Chronicle, with the exact official results direct from County Clerk Brown at Prineville. The Chronicle had to pay for this news, but though it came high the "paper with the red headline" simply had to have it because the people wanted it.

William P. Myers, republican candidate for district attorney, was defeated by about 824 votes out of total cast of 2,406 votes in both Wasco and Crook counties. He lost Crook by 95 votes.

F. E. Dayton, county assessor, received 347 votes to 299 votes cast for H. F. Jones, his opponent on the republican ticket. His plurality is 48.

William Johnson, for county treasurer, received 294 votes to 430 votes cast for W. J. F. King. King wins by a plurality of 136.

Frank Elkins, for sheriff, got 616 republican votes; H. C. Ellis defeated J. F. Blanchard, for county judge, by 82 plurality, and this is a big victory for the west end; Fred A. Rice beat F. H. May, for county surveyor, by 82 plurality, the same as for Ellis; R. A. Ford won out over M. A. Lehman, for school superintendent, by the narrow margin of 40 ballots. James Rice, for commissioner, received 617 votes. The republican figures for county officers are as follows:
