Mount Hood Capitalisis Get Busy.

QUIETLY but surely there has been erected and put into operation a large new sawmill 20 the Laidlaw tributory district. Its State of Oregon against C. Sam output is over 100,000 feet daily, and for the past fortnight it has been running full time six days a week.

Two mills of epual capacity are contemplated, with a combined mandy, of Bend. This charge has daily output of a quarter of a million feet. Material for the second mill is already on the ground. having been hauled thence from Dufur over the right of way of the projected Mt. Hood railroad

Inasmuch as the new sawmill, with its tremendous capacity and ample supply of marketable lumber, is built and operating on the eastern slope of the Cascade mountains, it is a safe guess to say that the rai road will quickly but too late to print the penalty. follow.

"UMALO, Ore. May 7 (Special Correspondence)-The team used by P. Van Tassel to hauf the mail from Laidlaw to Tumalo and Gist took fright last Friday while standing unhitched in front of Jensen's mail box near Tumalo, and dashed madly along the county road from that point to Gist, stopping voluntarily, panting, in front of the Gist post-Commercial national bank of office after galloping six miles. In the rig at the time was Mrs-Van Tassel's baby, Which remained there without being thrown out, being removed from the wagon at Gist by ready hands. The child's left heel was bared to the bone, it is reported, by a corner of the heavy seat cushion falling on it and pinning the infant down, but this is deemed fortunate as otherwise the baby might have bounced out of the wagon bottom and been killed.
