ADVOCATE TAKES OVER MT. SCOTT HERALD WITH THIS HEAR CONGRESSMAN DYER ON MAY 13

BILL BEARING HIS NAME IN CONGRESS ON COUNTRY. WIDE TOUR WILL SPEAK IN PORTLAND

Mr. Dyer Will Re-introduce His Measure in the Next Session of Congress.-Purpose to Acquaint American Citizens With the Horrors of Lynching in America

(Special) Representative Leonides C. Dyer of Missouri, who introduced the federal anti-lynching bill bearing his name in Congress, will address the people of Portland Sunday afternoon, May 13th, at 2:30 o'clock, at Lincoln

High School auditorium, under the

auspices of The Advocate.

Representative Dyer's measure was passed in the House of Representatives by a vote of 230 to 119 and was favorably reported by the committee on the judiciary of the senate. It had to be abandoned when a group of southern democratic senators served notice that their filibuster would be continued against the antilynching bill, holding up the business of the entire country, until a pledge was given by the republicans on Congressman Dyer's program by that the issue would not be forced in that session.

"I am going before the country on price paid to hear the lecture. the issue of lynching, a national shame which for thirty-five years the states have failed to end and the Federal government has failed to at-

"The Federal anti-Lynching bill is not sectional. It applies to every part of the country. It assumes that an atrocity in America is a national disgrace whether it occurs in Georgia, or Texas, or Oregon, or Illinois.

"I shall reintroduce this measure in the next Congress. It will be reintroduced, I believe, in the senate. Meanwhile I shall acquaint as many American citizens as possible with the horrors of lyaching in America, and with the provisions of the bill designed to end those horrors.

"We shall then see if a small minority of men from any group of ates can block an expression of the will of the people of this nation."
