## LOUISIANA WOMEN JOIN GOOD WILL MOVEMENT

New Orleans, La., May 1.—An important step in the Southern movement for better race relations was taken in New Orleans March 21-23, when more than forty of Louisiana's prominent women, leaders in religious and civic organizations met to study the situation, formulated a vigorous statement in behalf of good will and justice between the races. They joined the Race Relations Committee and declared that only Christian principles can solve the South's race problem. One of the strongest paragraphs in their paper was the one against lynching, declaring that it was inexcusable and must go.
