NEW YORK WET

Governor Smith of New York has signed the bill known as the Anti-Prohibition Bill, having for its object doing away with the Volstead Prohibition Act. In so doing the State of New York is defying the 18th Amendment to the United States Constitution. Now that the prohibition law has been repealed by the State of New York, the State is simply saying to the Government "Take hold of your own business of enforcing the prohibition law, and at your own expense." In this the Government has no comeback, for it cannot say to New York, that "You must enforce the 18th Air endment." any more than it would order New York to obey some other Federal function. In other words, New York is in the same position as Connecticut and Rhode Island, two states that have not ratified the 18th amendment. The position of New York on the liquor question is being keenly eyed by the whole world.

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
