REAL FRATERNAL MEN WANTED

The following kindly advice to fraternal organizations is clipped from the columns of the Fraternal Review of New York and it is not only good advice to the Grand Lodge but to subordinate lodges as well, everywhere: "There has never been a time in the history of fraternal societies among Negroes in America, when the active participation of real courageous men of strong personal convictions was needed more than it is today. We confess to a belief in the right of an aristocracy of brain to rule the destiny of our fraternal organizations. We believe that the 'mob' may be generally counted upon to be in the wrong. We would rather be right and know our cause to be just, than to be even the leader or kingpin of the mob. We believe that had the rule of brain and not that of brawn been the order of the day at Newark, N. J., the 'Crime of 1922' would never have been perpetrated. We know that there exists in the Order of Elks a fair sprinkling of men of unquestioned intelligence; but it is unfortunately also a fact, that many of this class of men are utterly lacking in the moral courage that is essentially necessary for the work that is ahead of them. There is no member of the Order of Elks who is in touch with the real situation and who loves the Order, who desires to see the crime of 1922 repeated at Chicago; but there is grave apprehension that it will be, unless our prayer that 'God Give Us Men' is heard."

NEW YORK WET

Governor Smith of New York has signed the bill known as the Anti-Prohibition Bill, having for its object doing away with the Volstead Prohibition Act. In so doing the State of New York is defying the 18th Amendment to the United States Constitution. Now that the prohibition law has been repealed by the State of New York, the State is simply saying to the Government, 'Take hold of your own business of enforcing the prohibition law, and at your own expense.' In this the Government has no comeback, for it cannot say to New York, that 'You must enforce the 18th Amendment,' any more than it would order New York to obey some other Federal function. In other words, New York is in the same position as Connecticut and Rhode Island, two states that have not ratified the 18th amendment. The position of New York on the liquor question is being keenly eyed by the whole world.

Now that it has been settled for a fact that President Harding will be the guest of Portland July 4th, we are wondering if the entertainment committee will have amongst its personnel a representative of the colored population.

There is such a great inducement for young people to be nothing that it is perfectly wonderful when we find those who have been able to resist the many pitfalls and temptations and the howls of the mob, and be somebody in spite of them.

Quit talking so much about what you are going to do and do what you think is right and best for all concerned.

W. C. NORTH PLEDGES BEST BUSINESS ABILITY TO PUBLIC

William C. North, manager of the Morgan building, is a candidate for school director at the election, June 16th.

Mr. North has issued the following statement in connection with his candidacy: In announcing myself as a candidate for school director of district No. 1, I pledge myself to the welfare of the public schools, believing them to be the most important of our institutions.

I believe every dollar of the taxpayers' money should be expended efficiently in order that the business of the school may be conducted with the same economy as is given to private business.

Because of my familiarity with buildings and their construction, and business matters in general, voters of the district have suggested that I possess the qualifications of a director, and as my heart is in the work I have consented to become a candidate.



As a taxpayer I shall endeavor to conserve the money which the public pays for school taxes, and as one deeply interested in our public school system, will work at all times for its best interests.

For these reasons I ask the support of the voters at the coming school election. In 1912 he was elected and served as republican presidential elector from Oregon, and he also served as a member of the lower house during the 1921 regular and special sessions of the state legislature.

At the beginning of the World War Mr. North volunteered for service but was not accepted, but instead was commissioned to reorganize the national guard, which he did, raising to the rank of colonel. At the conclusion of the war he turned the

guard back to the former officers and went to the reserve list.

He is a member of all branches of the Masonic fraternity and is a member of the Oddfellows, Elks, Woodmen of the World, Modern Woodmen, Royal Arcanum, Portland Chamber of Commerce and many local clubs.

Mr. North has the support of a large number of prominent business men and organizations.

WOMEN URGE RE-ELECTION OF MR. SHULL

Saturday, June 16th, is a very important school election day. Every parent should vote. The children are entitled to this much interest on our part. All registered persons may vote for director, but only taxpayers on the bond issue.

Managing a school system for 40,000 children is probably much the biggest business in Oregon. The best men we can elect as directors are none too good. The school board spends more money by far than any other public body.

Three years ago Mr. Frank Shull was put forward as a candidate by the women of the city. He has served three years. In the opinion of those same women and thousands of others, he has been fair, broad in his policies, far-sighted, intelligent. He has stood always for the best interests of all the children. When we have such a man on the board and he is willing to serve again, we should re-elect him overwhelmingly.

He has been said by some to be against bond issues for new school houses. This is not true at all. He believes we must secure good school houses for all the children. But he is against waste and extravagance. He wants to build carefully so that we will not make the same kind of mistakes in buildings that we have in the past. And he would have preferred to have a survey of building needs made by experts before the bond issue was presented to the people.

We hope that those who read this statement will agree with us. If they do, we wish they might do all possible to get all parents to the polls next Saturday and support Mr. Shull.

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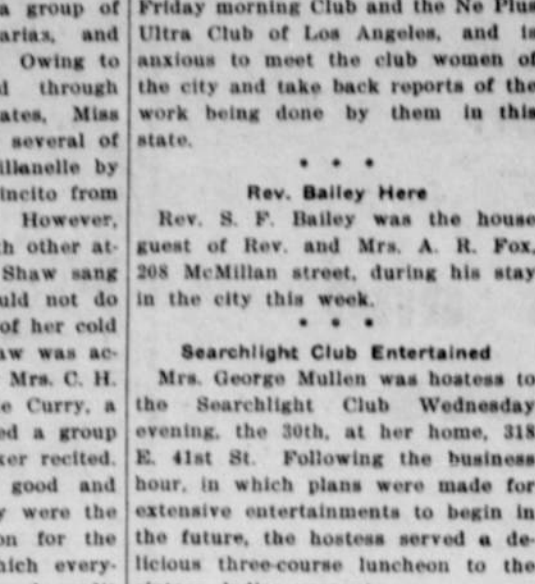
