OREGON URGED TO AID IN PREVENTING BULL FIGHT IN THE SOUTH

Bull fights will be held in New Orleans next Saturday unless the governor of Louisiana interferes to stop them, according to a telegram received by Mrs. F. W. Swanton, general manager of the Oregon Humane Society, from Minnie Maddern Fliske, the well known actress. Mrs. Swanton today urged local people to send telegrams protesting against the fights. Mrs. Fliske's message asks: "Please immediately influence as many people as possible to wire the governor of Louisiana and all editors of New Orleans newspapers, urging them to use their great power to prevent national disgrace and calamity. Assure editors and governor we depend upon them."

The above news item, clipped from The (Portland, Ore.) Daily Journal, attracted our attention, and we reproduce it for the benefit of those who may not have read it in the daily press. We are interested in the fact that the actress views bull-fighting as a national calamity and disgrace. We wonder then what she would think of the Louisiana pastime of lynching and burning human beings at the stake. We also wonder how many times she has called upon the people of the nation and the public press to use their influence to put an end to this inhuman practice. We wonder.

We admit that bull-fighting smacks of savagery, but of the two sports we believe bull-fighting to be the less atrocious, if only from the fact that those who engaged in the bull-fighting have their choice of engaging or not engaging. In the latter the victim of the lynching has no choice but that of his torturers.
