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## NOTED PULPIT ORATOR COMPARES GARVEY WITH ST. PAUL BEADS MISLAID, DOCTOR WHIPS MAID

DR. BLANCHARD, LEADING WHITE PHYSICIAN IN SOUTHERN CITY, TAKES WIFE'S COLORED MAID INTO WOODS, SEVERELY BEATS HER BECAUSE HE BELIEVED SHE STOLE WIFE'S BEADS.—MAGISTRATE SEES WHIPPING

Wife of Child Whom Maid Nursed Save Maid's Life.—Returning Home Wife Announces That Beads Had Been Found.—Doctor Dresses Wounds of Victim.—Issues Challenge to Colored People.

Augusta, Ga., July 29.—A typical southern incident, exhibiting the chivalry (?) of the well born white man of the South has come to light within the past few days.

Over at Williston, S. C., Dr. Blanchard is the leading white physician. His wife employed a colored girl named Geraldine Anderson. Recently, Mrs. Blanchard misplaced a string of beads and immediately accused the colored girl of taking them.

Without further investigation, the gallant Dr. Blanchard took the girl out into the woods and proceeded to give her a severe whipping. In fact, if it had not been for the screams and cries of his step-son, born to Mrs. Blanchard by a former marriage, who was fond of his colored nurse, the girl might have been killed.

To add dignity to the occasion, a magistrate was present and witnessed the whipping.

Then—when the doctor, the magistrate, the step-son and the victim returned to the house, the wife announced that the beads had been

found just where she had mislaid them.

As an evidence of his humane feeling and civilized character, the doctor dressed the poor girl's sacrificed back, then announced, with brave and courageous soul, that he would like to see the Negroes help themselves. And this announcement he made to a Negro.

Collins. Father John is the sixth priest of his race to be ordained in this country. The ceremony was attended by many prominent Catholic priests and others.

Father John, who is a native of Grenada, B. W. I., was educated at St. Joseph's College, Baltimore; Laval University, Quebec, and with the African Missionary Fathers in Holland and Carthage, Africa. Poor health forced him to give up his studies in Carthage and seek a more favorable climate. Hence it was that he came to North America to complete his studies.

**FIELD SECRETARY OF THE GREAT NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION PREACHES SPECIAL SERMON IN BEHALF OF MARCUS GARVEY.—PROVES BY SACRED WRIT THAT PERSECUTION IS PERIL OF PROPHET.—CITES ST. PAUL**

Says America Is Made Less Safe for Democracy in General and Black Man in Particular if Justice Is Denied Garvey.—Every Race Urged to Protest Incarceration of "Illustrious Character."

New York, July 23.—"An appeal to Caesar" was the subject of a special sermon in behalf of Marcus Garvey, delivered by the Rev. W. H. Moses, D. D., pastor of the New York National Baptist Church and Field Secretary of the National Baptist Convention of the U. S. A., at the 11 o'clock service on Sunday morning to a large congregation.

Dr. Moses took his text from the 25th chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, the 11th verse: "If I be an offender or have committed anything worthy of death, I refuse not to die. But if there be none of these things whereof they accuse me, no man may deliver me unto them. I appeal to Caesar." Eloquently and in able manner, Dr. Moses made a soul-stirring appeal to public sentiment to so fashion itself that Marcus Garvey may be released. No aspect of the question was left untouched. And, summing up, he said he was prepared to do his bit by letting the truth be known to the 2,500,000 people of these United States with whom he came into contact as Field Secretary of the National Baptist Convention.

**Garvey, the Apostle**  
Beginning his address, he said: "The spirit and circumstances of this text is parallel to the experiences of Marcus Garvey, who is truly God's modern apostle of African redemption as the Apostle Paul was to the Gentiles in his day and generation. Paul was condemned and imprisoned without bail, primarily by misinformed public opinion under the immediate leadership of reactionary members of his own race under pressure of the over-awing, world ruling Romans, condemned for being a propagandist of the universal application of the principles of justice and fraternal democracy, as preached and practiced by Jesus of Nazareth, though he was technically condemned for violating the letter of Roman law, equitably while fulfilling the spirit of that same law towards all individuals, races and nations in all the world."

The bill of indictment drawn by Tertulius, an eloquent Roman lawyer,

charged Paul with being (1) a public racial pest, (2) a creator of disloyalty among his race to the subjugating Roman rulers of the world, (3) irreverence for the Jewish church of his day and (4) for being a ring leader of the sect of the Nazarenes. From their view point there was half truth in all four counts of the indictment. Paul was a pest to the old order of lawful subjugation and injustice toward individuals and races farthest down. He was a pest to that. The peril of the prophet and the apostles of progress is that progress necessarily upsets precedent, and they, like Jesus, are invariably reckoned among the transgressors of Caesar. Eloquent and in able manner, Dr. Moses made a soul-stirring appeal to public sentiment to so fashion itself that Marcus Garvey may be released. No aspect of the question was left untouched. And, summing up, he said he was prepared to do his bit by letting the truth be known to the 2,500,000 people of these United States with whom he came into contact as Field Secretary of the National Baptist Convention.

**Hostility to a Program**  
"Marcus Garvey has been technically found guilty of misusing the United States mails in attempting to put over his African redemption program, but judicial equity can well afford to make large allowance for violating the letter of U. S. postal laws in his attempt to carry out the spirit of American democracy toward all people, as set forth in our Declaration of Independence and National Constitution. And judicial equity would undoubtedly have been more lenient in judgment if the ruling public sentiment of America and the modern world had not been hostile to the Marcus Garvey propaganda of African redemption, at a time when Africa and the Africans are being systematically subjugated and exploited by the white races of every nation with whom they come in contact."
