

Warren G. Harding, who died at 7:30 o'clock Thursday evening in San Francisco, California, of apoplexy. The end came suddenly while Mrs. Harding was reading to him from the evening papers. "That's good, go on; read more," were his last words. The body was taken to Washington, where it lay in state in the capitol rotunda from 10:30 a. m. to 6 p. m. Wednesday. Funeral services held at Marion, Ohio, the deceased's old home town, Friday, where the remains were also laid to rest. President Coolidge, ex-President Wilson, Chief Justice Taft of the U. S. Supreme Court, and many other notables participated in the last sad rites. In Portland last Sunday all churches without regard to previous arrangements, held memorial services for the late President, and Friday was officially observed.

HARDING'S LIFE LINKED WITH NEWSPAPER Facts about the late President, Warren G. Harding:

Birthplace-Blooming Grove, Morrow County, Ohio; born November 2, 1865.

Education—Attended Ohio Central College; graduated Iberia College, 1882.

Occupation-Newspaper man since 1884. Business-Ex-president of Harding Publishing Company, publishers of the Marion Star of Marion, Ohio. Church-Baptist.

Family-Married to Florence Kling of Marion, Ohio, July 8, 1891

Career-Member Ohio state senate 1900-1904; lieutenant-governor of Ohio 1904-1906; defeated as republican candidate for governor November 8, 1910; United States senator from Ohio, 1915-1921; republican nominee for president, June 12, 1920; elected president November 2, 1920; inaugurated March 4, 1921; died August 2, 1923.
