## DYER'S NEW TOUR FOR ANTI-LYNCH LAW

CONGRESSMAN LEONIDAS C. DYER OF MISSOURI WHO SPOKE IN PORTLAND SEVERAL MONTHS AGO ON THE ANTI-LYNCH LAW TO MAKE NEW TOUR FOR N. A. A. C. P.

New Tour to Embrace States of New York, New Jersey and Ohio. In Mr. Dyer's Previous Tour He Covered the Middle West and Far Western States.—Outlook is Fine

New York, N. Y., Aug. 3.—Representative Leonidas C. Dyer of Missouri is making a new tour in behalf of the Federal Anti-Lynching Bill, under the auspices of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. This new tour, during August and September, will embrace the states of New York, New Jersey and Ohio. Previously Mr. Dyer has toured the middle and the far West.

Meetings thus far scheduled under the auspices of N. A. A. C. P. branches include: Cleveland, O., Aug. 9; Rochester, N. Y., Aug. 10; Lockport, N. Y., Aug. 11; Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 12; Lackawanna, N. Y., Aug. 13; and Atlantic City, N. J., Aug. 15. On September 19, Mr. Dyer will speak in Zanesville, O., on the 20th in Springfield, O., and on the 21st in Cincinnati, Ohio.

**"Will Take Care of Old Customers or Any Others Who Might Drop in, But Don't Care to Have New Ones."—Says Race Problem Can Be Solved by Race Becoming Good Artisans**

When we came to Portland many days ago, we heard so much about Powers Furniture Company that we were lead to believe it was the only furniture company in the city. THE LATE PRESIDENT MOURNED BY ENTIRE NATION



Warren G. Harding, who died at 7:30 o'clock Thursday evening in San Francisco, California, of apoplexy. The end came suddenly while Mrs. Harding was reading to him from the evening papers. "That's good, go on; read more," were his last words. The body was taken to Washington, where it lay in state in the capitol rotunda from 10:30 a. m. to 6 p. m. Wednesday. Funeral services held at Marion, Ohio, the deceased's old home town, Friday, where the remains were also laid to rest. President Coolidge, ex-President Wilson, Chief Justice Taft of the U. S. Supreme Court, and many other notables participated in the last sad rites. In Portland last Sunday all churches without regard to previous arrangements, held memorial services for the late President, and Friday was officially observed.

**HARDING'S LIFE LINKED WITH NEWSPAPER**  
Facts about the late President, Warren G. Harding:  
Birthplace—Blooming Grove, Morrow County, Ohio; born November 2, 1865.  
Education—Attended Ohio Central College; graduated Iberia College, 1882.  
Occupation—Newspaper man since 1884.  
Business—Ex-president of Harding Publishing Company, publishers of the Marion Star of Marion, Ohio.  
Church—Baptist.  
Family—Married to Florence Kling of Marion, Ohio, July 8, 1891.  
Career—Member Ohio state senate 1900-1904; lieutenant-governor of Ohio 1904-1906; defeated as republican candidate for governor November 3, 1910; United States senator from Ohio, 1915-1921; republican nominee for president, June 12, 1920; elected president November 2, 1920; inaugurated March 4, 1921; died August 2, 1923.
