THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

One among the first big official acts that President Coolidge should do if he is the believer in justice and equal opportunity as he is thought to be. He will recall Leonard Wood, who is the governor-general of the Philippine Islands, and give to the island its independence, for the Philippine people have proven in many ways that they are fitted for self-government.

Wallace A. Battle, announced by the Associated Press' Boston representative, as being president of the Okolona Industrial School (wherever that may be), says he thinks that "a southern white man ought to control the U. S. Veterans' hospital at Tuskegee, and let Negroes recommend the southerner." If that "Negro boot-licker" is still in Boston we trust Editor William Monroe Trotter of The Guardian will have his head examined immediately so that the truth may be published as to Battle's sanity.—Now dear editor of the Cleveland (Ohio) Gazette, don't you know that Prof. Battle didn't mean what he said. He lives in Mississippi. See!

We read much about the causes of the migration of the colored people to the North. Many different reasons are given but to those who have lived in the South and those who know anything about conditions as they exist among the colored people there, the answer is obvious. With white mobs lynching colored people almost daily; with poor schools, still more poorly equipped; jimcrow street and railway cars and public parks closed to them; besides a long list of other injustices, the wonder is that the colored people have not left the South long before.

We fear that the politicians are going to expect too much of President Coolidge.

With an U. B. F. Lodge just organized and a dozen or more other lodges in operation there is no reasonable excuse for a fellow not to get into some of them.

There must be a lot of money in boat excursions and picnics to judge by the number that is being pulled off by our people.

WILL MR. COOLIDGE MAKE GOOD?

We especially look forward to our new President to make good for at least two reasons. First, he is from the right part of the country. That part where men are treated as men, where the brotherhood of man is being exercised. Second, in Mr. Coolidge's speech of acceptance, July 27, 1920, he said the "Negro holds a double title to citizenship" because of his loyalty to the nation and his investment in liberty bonds (one out of every five), etc. For these reasons Mr. Coolidge said the Negro should "be relieved from imposition, to be defended from lynching and be freely granted equal opportunities." Let us as individuals and as associations and as lodges and as churches keep the situation before him, for one soon and easily forgets these things after going into office, especially when surrounded by administration heads and advisors. There are two important questions before him now, viz., the Tuskegee affair and the Anti-Lynching Bill. I am sure we can only use the "watchful waiting" policy as we keep the issues before him. REV.
