World Congress Aims to

Solve Traffic Problem Responsible government officials the world over now recognize the utilitarian value of the motor vehicle as an element in transportation, according to Pyke Johnson, representative of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, who has just returned from a study of transport conditions abroad. Johnson attended the fourth session of the international road congress at Seville, where some 600 of the leading highway officials of the globe gathered to exchange information and views.

"The dominant note at Seville," he said, "was a general recognition that motor transport is on a permanent basis abroad as well as in the United States, and with this in mind, discussion centered on ways and means of giving its use the broadest possible mic application.

"Among the resolutions passed were those calling for governmental aid for motorbus lines in communities and countries where inadequate facilities now exist; the need for uniform trafsive studies into city and rural planning in order to allay congestion and Salem.-Linn B.
