

INDIANAPOLIS WHITE WOMAN WRITES SECRETARY NEW TO REMOVE COLORED MAIL CARRIER OFF HER ROUTE—OBJECTED TO HAVING HER MAIL DELIVERED BY BLACK MAN

Threatens Bodily Injury to Letter Carrier.—Secretary Writes That All the Power of Government Would Be Brought Into Play to Protect Carrier If Necessary

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 15.—That the United States government is able to protect all of its employees and has the disposition to do so is the burden of a letter received by Mrs. Otto J. Deeds (white) of this city from Postmaster General Harry S. New. Mrs. Deeds objected to having a colored man deliver her mail and when the local postmaster refused to remove the carrier from his route, she wrote General New, threatening bodily injury to the carrier if a white man was not placed on the district. General New's letter has won general satisfaction from both white and colored people, not only in this state, from which he hails, but from all over the country. The letter follows:

"My dear Madam: Your letter of July 23, complaining that a colored man is serving as mail carrier on the route on which you happen to live in Indianapolis, has been brought to my attention. I note your complaints and your implied threats directed against this man. I am further informed, as I have been on previous occasions, that you have repeatedly complained of the fact that your route was thus served, employing most intemperate language and threatening all sorts of consequences to the carrier if the

matter was not arranged to your personal satisfaction.

"I have to say that there are a number of colored carriers in the service of the Indianapolis postoffice as there are in postoffices all over the country. These men have attained their positions in accordance with the requirements of the law and the postoffice regulations. They are entitled to the respect to which all faithful employees of the United States government are entitled to all times and at all places, without regard to race, color or political consideration. The Postoffice Department could not, if it could, be so unjust to this the consequence of such a violent outburst as is contained in the letter over your signature which is now before me, and the department would remind you that all the power this government has at its command will be employed to protect its employees against violence or wrong resulting from anybody's prejudices, from whatever cause arising, so long as those employees faithfully discharge the duties which have been entrusted to them, which I am assured by the postmaster at Indianapolis the carrier in question does. Very respectfully yours, Harry S. New, Postmaster General."

MAYOR CAUFFIEL OF JOHNSTON, PA., WHO ORDERED ALL COLORED PEOPLE OUT OF CITY, RUNS POOR FIFTH FOR RE-ELECTION.—GOV. PINCHOT ASKS EXPLANATION

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 21.—Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania wired the N. A. A. C. P. September 18th pledging that "the whole power of this commonwealth will be used, if necessary, to maintain constitutional rights" and declaring that he had "wired Mayor Cauffiel for full statement of facts and reason for action taken" in the wholesale deportation of Negroes from Johnstown, Pa. The Governor's wire was in response to a protest from the Association against the action of the Johnstown mayor in ordering all Negroes in that city who had not been residents for seven years to leave Johnstown immediately following the killing of two policemen by a drink crazed colored man who was later killed by the police. Governor Pinchot's telegram, addressed to James Weldon Johnson, secretary of the N. A. A. C. P., reads:

"Your telegram received. On return to Milford wired Mayor Cauffiel asking him for full statement of facts and reason for action taken. The whole power of this commonwealth will be used if necessary to maintain constitutional rights."

According to press dispatches of September 16, Mayor Cauffiel declared on being asked his opinion of the Association's protest that he didn't care what authority I have; for their own safety and for the safety of the Johnstown public the Negroes are going out of this city. . . . They tell me I'm going to get into trouble. I don't care what they say. . . . If the rest of them (the Negroes) don't get out soon, I'll arm police and send them into the colonies to walk the Negroes out of town at the point of a gun."

Upon being called to account by Gov. Pinchot, Mayor Cauffiel attempted to deny he had ordered all Negroes and Mexicans to get out of town, declaring that he had merely "advised" them to get out in a newspaper interview. However, according to Associated Press dispatches of September 20, the arbitrary action of the mayor caused his defeat in the primaries on September 19. In a field of seven candidates he ran a poor fifth. The New York press headed the news account, "Mayor's Negro Ban Costs Him His Job."

The N. A. A. C. P. announced today that it was determined to push the case against the mayor to the fullest extent. The Association has a trained investigator in Johnstown who is rapidly gathering evidence which, it is hoped, will form a basis for impeachment proceedings against Mayor Cauffiel. It is felt that this will be possible especially in view of the fact that the Mexican government through its embassy at Washington has joined with the N. A. A. C. P. in moving against the mayor. An official note of inquiry was sent by the Mexican embassy to the Secretary of State of the United States on September 19, requesting full reports on the alleged deportation of Mexican citizens from the Pennsylvania steel town. The embassy further announced it had instructed the Mexican consulate at Philadelphia to proceed to Johnstown and report. The embassy contended the mayor had no legal authority to expel peaceful Mexican residents.

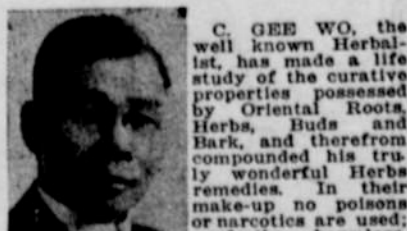

That fighting Governor down in Oklahoma City who is making history faster than any other one individual, has been the friend to the man under for years. The story goes that colored people in Oklahoma refused to allow him to speak at their meetings; they voted against him at election time and let him know in no uncertain terms that the colored people were against him, first, last and forever. This attitude on the part of colored people caused Jack Walton to "sit up and take notice". He sent for Dr. Isaac W. Young, president of Langston University, Langston, Okla., an educational institution for colored people, and to ten other representative people of the race Governor Walton let it be understood that he was not only a friend to the colored people but a friend to all persecuted humanity. Since his election to the Governor's chair, Walton has stood behind President Young at Langston and for the first time in the school's history, it has become an accredited institution. He has told Young who is himself a man of the first rank to go the limit in putting the school over. One of the improvements at Langston is an enlarged faculty. And through this educator the Governor is keeping a close tab on colored schools throughout the state.

According to reports received as we go to press Governor Walton has received a telegram from government officials at Washington, D. C., barring the use of government buildings for a meeting of the Oklahoma State Legislature to impeach the Governor. Oklahoma City is under military rule and additional guards have been ordered to report there to assist in any crisis that may occur.
