The leaders say, however, that after the election the recall will be resumed.

GETTING ONTO THEMSELVES

The fellow who said colored people must learn to get onto themselves before they can hope to get anywhere, by doing the things worth while, knew what he was talking about. For it is a well known fact that some of them act just like parrots; they sit around in their clubs or stand on the corners and talk about those who are trying to do something to help the race in a business way; yet these same people have no business of their own or anything else of credit to attend to. Some of them seem to think that the manner they act and the more they talk about others, the better they get along and the bigger they appear. But they were never more mistaken. In conversation with a white business man the other day, he said: "The trouble with your people is, they are narrow minded and too envious of the prosperity of each other. It is easy," said he, "for any other race of people to make a door mat out of your people, because instead of fighting for one another they fight one another."

Why say colored people are cursed and abused? Why blame our own dirty meanness on a just God, when we ourselves curse and cause each other? Why blame the white man for scorning us and being prejudiced because of our color, when we, as a race, despise ourselves, which is evidenced by constant inferior reference to our color and the texture of our hair, and by the usage of the nasty terms "nigger" and "coon"? Think on these things.

The Income Tax Measure, which is to be approved or rejected by the voters at the special election November 6th, is a mighty important measure, and every qualified voter ought to go to the polls and register their preference.

COLOR PREJUDICE STOPS FOOT-BALL GAME

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 3.—The scheduled football game between Washington and Lee colleges was officially declared off Saturday when the latter team refused to play against Charles West, star negro half back on the Washington and Jefferson team for the last three years and winner of the national pentathlon

championship at Philadelphia last year.
Upon arrival of the Washington and Lee team, Graduate Manager Smith protested against playing West, declaring it was one of the traditions of the southern institution that its athletes should not compete against a colored player. Coach Heisman declined to bar West from the game, pointing out that he was a bona fide student and had represented the college in three previous years, this being his final year.

The final decision in the controversy was made by the heads of the two institutions. Dean Campbell of the Washington and Lee faculty informed of the situation by a long distance telephone, gave instructions that the team should not play against a colored athlete. The ultimatum was delivered to President Baker of Washington and Jefferson, who upheld Coach Heisman's ruling that West should not be barred.

OHIO LABOR BODY BACKS ANTI-LYNCH BILL

NEW YORK CITY, Oct. 5.—At the recent meeting of the Ohio Federation, E. J. Maxwell, colored delegate of the Cleveland Building Laborers, told the laboring men of the effect of lynching and oppression in the South, in bringing about the heavy northward migration with its consequent flooding of the labor market and sharp competition for jobs.

Thereupon the Federation voted to back to reintroduction of the Dyer Anti-Lynching Bill by Representative Dyer in the next Congress.

NEW YORK'S RESERVE OF WIN-SOME WIDOWS

NEW YORK CITY, Oct. 16.—The city of New York has 10,238 colored widows and ranks in first place in this respect among other cities of the country. Washington brings up an ambitious second with 9,051, and is followed in order named by Chicago, New Orleans, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Atlanta, Memphis, St. Louis and Birmingham.

TOBACCO FARMERS ASK RECOGNITION

BALTIMORE, Md., Oct. 11.—Representation upon the board of directors of the Tobacco Growers' Association has been asked for by colored farmers of Southern Maryland, who grow and market most of the tobacco pro-

duced in the state. It is believed that this representation is needed to insure their protection in the grading and price-fixing, in which important matters they have no voice at the present time.

COLORED MIGRANTS DOUBLE SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—The aggregate number of colored children, 7 to 20 years of age, attending school has almost doubled in northern and border cities into which Southern migrants have been steadily flowing during the last few years. Philadelphia has the distinction of having the greater number of these children in schools than any other city in the United States. Disregarding locations, the percentage of school attendance in all cities having 10,000 or more colored children of this age group, is the greatest in Washington, which is closely followed in the order named by Philadelphia, Chicago, Birmingham, Baltimore, New Orleans and New York.

AFRICAN PRINCE SAYS AMERICAN DESCENDANTS CANNOT RULE AFRICA

NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 10.—Speaking before a large audience at John M. Brown A. M. E. church, Madarikani Denyi, reputed African prince, is quoted as having said: "Let it be understood that the African rulers will not allow the American Negro agitators and their dupes to bring any of their conspiracy into that continent for the purpose of defrauding the natives. It is against the ancient African laws and traditions for a slave or a descendant of a slave to dictate to or control the kings, chiefs, princes and presidents. Politically and financially speaking the American Negroes are not in a position of controlling a free empire of their own part in Africa, because it takes a lot of money and education to control a government."
