### South Carolina Girl Gets Exclusive Recording Contract.



LAST week, Miss Josie Miles, who hails from Summerville, S. C., was signed up by the Starr Piano Co., of Richmond, Ind., as an exclusive singer of "Blues" for the "Gennett" records. All of which means a great deal when you know that prior to a week ago Miss Miles had never warbled her melodious voice into a recording horn and is the first Race artist to be signed up to sing exclusively for that company. On the recommendation of Jos. M. Davis, under whose direction she is now working, Miss Miles made a test for Gennett and was immediately offered a tempting contract calling for forty "Blues" numbers during the coming twelve months. Two days following the signing of the contract Miss Miles made "Baby's Got the Blues" and "Kansas City Man Blues," which will be released shortly.

Although Miss Miles never had any recording experience, she isn't an utter stranger to the public, as she was quite a favorite with the "Shuffle Along" company, which enjoyed long and prosperous runs in New York and other big cities. A veteran phonograph man who has had the pleasure of hearing Miss Miles' maiden records predict she is a real find and that she will be a sensation within a few months.

### N. A. A. C. P. NOTES

The annual election of officers for the association will be held on Monday evening, November 12th, at 8:30 at Bethel A. M. E. Church. The ministers of the several colored churches will preach special sermons on Sunday, November 11th, on the causes leading up to the riot at Houston, Texas, in August, 1917, in which a number of persons were killed and injured. For daring to defend their manhood, 19 colored soldiers were hanged, 67 were sentenced to life and long term imprisonment. Of the imprisoned, 54 are still in the Leavenworth Federal penitentiary. The National Association is making a supreme effort to have these men pardoned, and is endeavoring to send in petitions signed by many thousands of people asking for executive clemency. Petitions have been distributed to the various lodges, clubs, churches and other organizations in Portland, and will be forwarded by the local branch to the central association in New York as soon as collected.

### DIVISION OF 136,065 NEGROES AMONG RAILROAD EMPLOYES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 24.—What connection have the colored Americans with the great transportation arteries of the country, which were conceived by Republican policies, installed by Republican ingenuity and regulated by Republican laws?

At the outset it must be understood that of the 777,132 stockholders, owning the railroads of the United States 702,432, or 90 per cent, live in the North, East and West; while only 74,699, or 10 per cent, live in the South. That section has been quite as laggard in financing transportation as in recognition of human justice.

Transportation is to the country what the arteries are to the body—it distributes the nation's production, population and food and develops its resources. But we asked: "What connection have the colored people, as a class, with this massive industry?"

The 136,065 Negroes employed by the railroads in the United States are the answer. Of this number thus employed are 2204 females, of whom 46 are flagwomen. There are also a number of maids on the finest equipped trains, while 2058 colored women are classed as laborers, probably car cleaners for the most part. Among the men there is naturally a greater diversity of occupation. Of the 133,861 males employed in this branch of industry, 95,921 are laborers; 20,201 are porters; 6395 are firemen; 3502 are boiler washers and hostlers, and 2887 are switchmen and flagmen. There are 1181 foremen, 616 yardmen, 475 baggagemen and 111 engineers; while in the administrative grades there are 3 steam railroad officials, 217 inspectors, 33 conductors, 16 tickets and station agents and 7 freight agents.

A conservative estimate of the aggregate wages and salaries received by these colored railroad employees will not fall short of \$150,000,000 a year—a sum of sufficient importance to justify, on the part of colored leaders and voters, a close scrutiny of all railroad legislation, particularly of a national character, that is calculated to affect the earning capacity and the wage scales of our transportation systems. From the foregoing figures, which are as absolutely authentic as figures can be, it would appear that there are many economic questions of arresting interest to colored people, which should command their attention and close study.
