## NATIONAL ASSOCIATION ENDORSES TICKET PORTLAND HAS MANY COLORED CHURCHES

**SUNDAY (TOMORROW) DAWNS AUSPICIOUSLY IN RELIGIOUS CIRCLES WITH TWO PRACTICALLY NEW CHURCHES OPENING—ZION AND BETHEL GET NEW MINISTERS.**

**Shiloh Baptist Church Resumes Sunday Afternoon Services—New Baptist Mission Is Started at Tenth and Everett Streets—St. Phillips Moves into New Home.**

For a colored population of its size, the city of Portland has many beautiful churches. Among the latest to make its debut upon the religious horizon in the form of a comeback, after months of silence, is Shiloh, out in Montavilla. A new Baptist mission has been opened at 10th and Everett Sts., the former home of the Independent Baptist church, founded by Rev. E. C. Dyer, prior to his call to Mt. Olivet. With the establishment of the new mission, the total of Baptist churches will be raised to three. There are two Methodist churches, both of which have new pastors, Rev. F. X. Runyon of Bethel and Rev. H. Leo Johnson of Zion. The Seventh Day Adventists and the Church of Christ, together with St. Phillips Episcopal, make a total of eight.

**St. Phillips Episcopal Mission**  
On the southeast corner of Knott

and Rodney Sts. the St. Phillips Episcopal mission has purchased a modern church edifice, where on (tomorrow) Sunday at 11 A. M. Bishop Walter T. Sumner of this Episcopal diocese will conduct the services. The already splendid choir has been augmented by a number of well trained voices. Those who avail themselves of the opportunity of attending the services will be assured of a real treat.

The interior decoration and arrangement of the furnishings and other equipment for the purpose of conducting the Episcopal service have not been fully completed. When this is done the mission will be among the best equipped church edifices of its kind in the city. The officers and members of the mission extend a hearty welcome to all to come out and worship with them in their new home.
