Miss Gauthier is now centered on the Portland concert to be given by Eva Gauthier, mezzo-soprano, on November 17th at the Auditorium, as one of the ten events on the Elwyn Artist series. This is Miss Gauthier's first appearance in Portland in her "Java to Jazz" program, and everyone is agog to hear this singer who first dared to introduce modern "jazz" on the concert stage.

On October 30th, Miss Gauthier gave her first New York concert of the season at Aeolian Hall, which was



as much a revelation and as unusual as all the things she does. The first group included folk songs and madrigals, a French air from the 14th Century and one from the 18th Century; a group of "Old and Modern Settings of Shakespeare," one of vocal chamber music with various combinations of instruments, piano, violin, viola, cello, flute and guitar; a group by contemporary Russian composers and one by French composers and a closing group of American "jazz."

Colored Veterans of Foreign Wars Active
Rheims Post Has Band of Thirty Pieces.

Atlantic City Colored Veterans of Foreign Wars assisted the white veterans to successfully entertain the Grand Convention of Veterans, held recently in that city. The name of the colored veteran post is Rheims Post No. 65, V. F. W., which was organized in October, 1920, by John Scarr and Herman Henson.

Through the aid of the Mayor of Atlantic City, Edward L. Bader, working in conjunction with the officers of the Rheims Post, it was enabled to entertain colored wounded convalescent soldiers for a period of two weeks. This was free of all expense to the ex-service patients. The first consignment of these soldiers arrived in the city on February 26th, 1921, and they were welcomed by the Mayor and City Commissioners.

The colors of the Rheims Post 64, V. F. W., were donated by Lighthouse Lodge No. 9, I. B. P. O. E. of W., through the efforts of Carey Truchart and Johnnie Johnson. The Rheims Post band of thirty pieces was organized in February, 1922, by Comrades Lionel Howard and Benjamin Whited. Feeling the need of a home for their activities the Post appealed to Mayor Edward L. Bader and the City Commissioners, and after a year's consultation the Home is now in process of construction at an estimated cost of \$235,000. The present officers of Rheims Post 64, V. F. W., are as follows: Commander, James N. Wilson; Senior Vice-Commander, Eugene Christian; Junior Vice-Commander, Charles Donaway; Quartermaster, Herman Henson; Chaplain, H. Wilson.

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Armistice Day Celebrations DAHLIA TEMPLE SETS PACE

Enthusiastic over recalling the thought of peace after our World war, rainfall had no effect, Nov. 11th, on the completeness of the parade or the largeness of the crowd to witness it. The long lines of representative business and civic units, the abundance of national decorations, the variety of interests manifested from all angles, and the execution of appropriate musical selections gave the occasion a most unique place in the history of celebrations, and of itself paid a glowing tribute to the designers of same. Noteworthy in the long train of paraders just behind the ex-soldiers, who were continuously applauded for valor and patriotism, was an auto moving noiselessly, and as it seemed by some unseen hand, bearing in front an Elk's head (said to be a contribution to the affair by the Stag Club) with its horns protruding amidst divergings of pink, red, white and blue; diverging from horn-tips to front corner tops of auto, whose whole top was covered with "Old Glory"; were streamers of like colors made of tulle; its rear was banked most artistically with green-anthemums, and in harmony with other decorated parts of the auto was further set off with bows and rosettes in the four said colors; and in the auto rode five women wearing trench caps, badges and sashes in accord with facial expression of loyalty, fraternalism, patriotism and franchiseism. These were daughters of I. B. P. O. E. of W., Dahlia Temple No. 202, viz.: Daughters Idella Harris, trustee; Marion McClear, trustee; Zulu Lowe, Omieda Harjo, and Beatrice H. Cannady, secretary.

Concerning this demonstration favorable comments were heard from all sides, on account of its distinctive, artistic decorations and uniqueness of presentation.
