OF CURRENT WEEK**

Brief Resume Most Important  
Daily News Items.

Events of Noted People, Governments  
and Pacific Northwest, and Other  
Things Worth Knowing.

After rescuing his nine children from their burning home near Centralia, Ill., Tuesday night, George Bierman Jr., 42, farmer, went back for his pocketbook. He was burned to death when the roof fell in.

Leo Koretz, a shabby wreck of the blithe master swindler who collected \$2,000,000 from enthusiastic relatives and friends through his Panama oil "bubble," Tuesday pleaded guilty in Chicago to four varieties of swindling.

Mrs. Alice W. Johnson, widow of an ex-president of the University of Wyoming, died in a hospital in Denver, Colo., Tuesday, an hour after she incurred a fractured skull in a fall down a flight of stairs. She was 72 years old.

With a total of 142 years to their credit, Joseph H. Frye, 70, and Mrs. Martha A. Mears, 72, of Klamath Falls, Or., procured a marriage license Wednesday.

Organization of the first linen mill west of the Mississippi river was perfected in Salem, Or., Wednesday night through the election of a board of directors and adoption of by-laws for the Miles Linen company, with headquarters in Salem. Articles of incorporation were filed here today.

A total of \$238,000,000, or \$31,000,000 less than the amount made available last year, was carried in the interior department supply bill as reported Tuesday to the house. First of the appropriation bills to receive committee approval, its figures were well under the budget estimates.

Five persons were burned to death in Detroit Wednesday night when an interurban car en route to Toledo and Cleveland crashed into a truck loaded with turpentine at Wyandotte, a suburb. The dead were so badly burned that it has not been possible to ascertain whether they were men or women.

The business of farming was the chief topic in Los Angeles, Cal., Tuesday in the first of the two-day session of the mid-year meeting of the western division of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Some thousand leading business men and financiers of the 11 western states attended the session.

Four or five unmasked men, who backed a truck up to the door of Guy and Dee Riegel's country home near Spokane after the family had gone to town early Tuesday, locked the four household employees in the basement and made off with furs, jewelry and household goods valued at more than \$8000, the sheriff's office was notified.

Incessant activity has been noted recently in the crater of the volcano Popocatepetl, the majestic peak which dominates the capital and the valley of Mexico from a height of nearly 13,000 feet. There is no indication of danger to the inhabitants of the surrounding country, according to experts of the National Geological Institute.

A net loss of nearly \$40,000,000 was sustained by the government in 1923 in operation of the postal service, it was shown in an expert analysis submitted to the senate Wednesday by Postmaster-General Nease. More than half the excess of gross expenditures over receipts was found to be chargeable against second-class mail, embracing newspapers and magazines.

On a charge of irregularities in conducting the "sticker" campaign in the campaign whereby P. H. Carlyon was elected to the Washington state senate for the 22d district on the republican ticket over Mrs. Ella M. Russell, the regular republican nominee, attorneys for Mrs. Russell filed papers contesting his election with the clerk of the Thurston county court Wednesday.

Sweeping changes in the government's reclamation policy are provided for in the second deficiency appropriation bill passed Tuesday by the senate, which carried with it as a rider the Smith-Gooding measure embodying recommendations of Secretary Work's fact-finding commission. This commission, composed of six experts, was appointed in October, 1923, and spent six months in an intensive study of the whole reclamation and irrigation problem.

Development of the X-ray to a point where it will render impossible the explosions of big guns, such as have resulted in large loss of life in recent years, are predicted Wednesday at the national defense forum of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers convened in New York, at which Dwight F. Davis, assistant secretary of war, and several army officers outlined the war department's plans for national preparedness.

**PROPOSE LAND UPBUILDING**

Reclamation Chief Submits Plans to Congress—State Interest Great.

Washington, D. C. — Recommendations for congressional action to permit a thorough investigation of potential agricultural resources of the west, and for the working out of a program of reclamation and power development for the benefit of all arid regions, were made in the annual report of Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation.

Indorsing the conclusion of the special advisory committee on reclamation, embodied in a bill which has passed the house and is pending before the senate, Dr. Mead called attention to a dawning realization that development requires a study of agricultural and economic problems, and the perfection of settlement and development plans, if lands are to be brought under cultivation without disastrous delays and waste of money and effort.

All the changes urged by the committee would be helpful, Dr. Mead asserted, "but if legislation stops with these, the amended reclamation act will not provide a working plan for the development of new projects. The reason for this is the fact that many of the best opportunities for future reclamation are where the land is now privately owned."

Discussing the committee's coordinated plan of settlement, under which the government would be able to purchase or control all privately owned lands in excess of homestead units, Commissioner Mead asserted that if control of settlement were made possible his bureau could go ahead with development, "certain that the future settler could get his farm at its actual value. It could proceed to subdivide excess lands into farms of proper size, could adjust the prices of land to agree with productive values and could give long-time payments with low interest."

Touching on the future need for state co-operation and state aid in the settlement and agricultural development of projects, the report recites that the state has an even greater interest than the nation in the character of the people who make homes on this land, since "the foundation of the state's future civilization is laid in these new communities."

**Grain Movement Grows.**

Washington, D. C.—Grain exports from the United States last week were 8,836,000 bushels against 5,433,000 bushels the previous week.

Commerce department figures also showed that 1,108,000 bushels of Canadian grain had been shipped from United States ports as compared with 952,000 bushels the previous week.

Detailed figures comparing the total with that of the previous week follow: Wheat, 6,673,000 bushels against 4,373,000; barley, 979,000 against 575,000; corn, 127,000 against 35,000; oats, 360,000 against 44,000; rye, 697,000 against 108,000.

Wheat flour, including Canadian mill products, shipped last week amounted to 345,000 barrels against 449,000 barrels the previous week.

**Spokane Man Appointed.**

Washington, D. C.—President Coolidge sent to the senate the nomination for reappointment to the interstate commerce commission of Baltheas H. Meyer of Wisconsin and W. B. Campbell of Spokane, Wash.

Albert C. Williams of Fort Worth, Texas, was nominated Monday by President Coolidge to be a member of the federal farm loan board, succeeding Merton L. Corey, who resigned.

The nomination list also included reappointment of Harry L. Fidler of Indiana and Edward T. Franks of Kentucky to the federal board for vocational training.

**Power Sale is Favored.**

Tacoma, Wash.—Sentiment in favor of legislative action to permit cities to sell power outside their limits at a 5 per cent tax developed Saturday at the first session of the Pierce county legislative delegation. The meeting was of an informal nature to discuss the legislative situation and organize for effective work in behalf of any measures beneficial to the county. Ralph Metcalf was elected president of the delegation with George W. Thompson secretary.

**Steel Output Reduced.**

New York.—Steel ingot production by all companies in November aggregated 3,107,226 tons, a decrease of 4225 tons under October and 27,995 less than in November, 1923, the American Iron & Steel Institute calculates from reports by companies which produced 94.84 per cent of the total output last year. Illinois Steel, subsidiary of U. S. Steel corporation, has blown in a furnace at Gary and another at South Chicago.

**Robbers Get \$310,000.**

Milwaukee, Wis.—Five robbers entered the Northwestern National bank here Monday, held up the cashier and escaped with \$310,000 in cash and bonds estimated at \$300,000.

Harry A. Dugman, cashier, was struck over the head and knocked unconscious when he attempted to resist the robbers. Three tellers were covered by pistols. Three customers were in the bank, but none were molested.

**GERMANS PAY BILL  
UNDER DAWES PLAN**

Great Britain and France Receive Installments.

**REFUND AIDS NATION**

Total Payments to Creditors in Three Months of New Scheme Are 227,000,000 Marks.

Berlin.—Germany paid Great Britain 17,500,000 gold marks and France slightly in excess of 1,250,000 gold marks under the recovery acts during November, bringing the total levied by both countries for the first three months of the operation of the Dawes plan up to 50,000,000 marks.

The report of Seymour Parker Gilbert, agent-general for reparation payments, on receipts and payments during November shows that Germany was reimbursed to the extent of 215,000,000 gold marks out of the proceeds of the German external loan in accordance with the provisions of the experts' plan which absolves Germany from the obligation to draw on her during the first year's annuity.

The sum refunded to Germany by Mr. Gilbert represents amounts remitted by her during the transition period. Germany is credited with 16,500,000 marks during the past quarter for the cost of the armies of occupation. Her deliveries of dye stuffs to Japan during November amounted to 771,000 marks as compared with 2237 marks during October. Germany's contribution to the restoration of the Louvain library during the past quarter amounted to 200,000 marks. Her total payments to creditor states in cash and in kind during the first three months of the agent-general's administration is given as 227,000,000 marks.

Mr. Gilbert will go to London for a consultation with British officials over routine matters connected with the operation of the agent-general's organization. He will call a meeting of the transfer committee in Paris December 15, when the method of applying to recovery acts will come up for decisive decision.

**IMMIGRATION INCREASES  
IN TWO YEARS' TIME**

Washington, D. C.—Immigration into the United States has more than doubled since 1922, the bureau of immigration declared Saturday, in its annual report to the secretary of labor. The figure increased from 309,556 in 1922 to 522,918 in 1923, and 706,896 in 1924.

The increase was principally due, the report showed, to the greater number of immigrants coming from European countries. Immigration from Turkey and southern and eastern Europe decreased from nearly 1,000,000 in 1914 to 150,000 in 1924.

The principal increases were shown as follows: From England, Scotland and Wales from 25,313 in 1922 to 59,949 in 1924; Ireland, 10,579 to 17,111; Germany, 17,931 to 75,091; Scandinavian countries, 14,825 to 35,577; British North America, 46,819 to 200,699 and Mexico, 19,551 to 89,336.

Under the quota limit law the report stated, so-called "birds of passage" have practically disappeared from the immigration movement.

"For a long period prior to the world war," the report said, "the number of aliens leaving the United States was fully one-third as great as the number admitted, but the exodus declined rapidly during the three years when the quota law was in operation until in the last year only 76,789 aliens departed, compared to 706,896 admitted."

The principal racial stocks represented in the immigrants this year were shown to be German, English, Mexican, Scotch, Italian, Hebrew, Scandinavian, Polish and African.

**Thirteen Reported Executed.**

Douglas, Ariz.—Mexican federal troops, who left Agua Prieta, Mex., across the border from here Saturday with 13 civilians charged with plotting a rebellion against the Calles government, for Naco, Mex., returned Sunday, refusing to say what had become of their prisoners. The captives did not reach Naco, the garrison commander said.

It was reported the 13 were executed.

**Missionaries Are Free.**

Hankow, China.—Miss Elizabeth Berglund and Miss Ineborg Nyatul, missionaries of the Augustana synod, who remained in their station at Juchow, Honan province, when bandits raided the place recently, have escaped and are with friends at Kih-sien. Both missionaries are from Minnesota.

The bandits hold Juchow with 1000 men. The soldiers refuse to fight them.

**Honduras Fight Looms.**

Managua, Nicaragua.—General Julio Peralta, with 500 troops, is near the frontier preparing for a new invasion of Honduras from Nicaragua, according to reports received here.
