Editor Jailed and Beaten

C. N. Love of Houston, Texas, editor of The Texas Freeman, was jailed and brutally beaten by officers last week in that city, alleged to have been seen leaving a house said to be a narcotic joint.

On entering the jail, the editor was knocked down and brutally beaten because he refused to take off his hat when he approached the sergeant's desk. Bail for the appearance of the editor was offered by some of Houston's wealthiest colored men, which was refused for several days, regardless of the fact that no charge had been filed against him. Love, by his vitriolic criticism of the police force's treatment of colored people, had incurred the enmity of the officers, and they took this it is said, as an opportunity to mistreat and humiliate him. This makes the second colored editor in Houston, Texas, to be outrageously treated by officials of that great southern city. Is it a wonder colored men leave the South?
