The magazine is published at 300 Broadway, San Francisco, at \$1 a year and 15 cents a copy. It should do a fine work to stimulate travel through California, Oregon, and Washington, especially along the great Pacific Highway that connects San Diego, Los Angeles, Portland, Tacoma, Seattle, and Vancouver.

Judge Blanche Funk Miller of Tacoma gave a most interesting talk on the mentality of abnormal and subnormal children, she wound up by quoting from Dr. Matthews (of Seattle) speech on his travels in Egypt, "The Quest of Life."

Mrs. Holczlaw of Spokane, first vice, gave an address on Reflection. She drew comparison of both the mental and physical reflections. This address was followed by the nominations for officers, in which Mrs. Ashberry of Tacoma and Mrs. Holczlaw of Spokane were the nominees for the presidency. Thursday Evening the Convention was favored by an address of Mrs. E. D. Cannady of Portland.

This followed by Mr. H. R. Cayton of Seattle who represented the N. A. A. C. P.

A promenade was given at Valhalla Temple where a demonstration of four dresses with one hundred pockets, which had been featured to raise funds for the state, were worn by ladies from the four cities—Spokane, Seattle, Everett and Tacoma. Following the election of officers a sight-seeing visit was given the delegates over the city parks.

L. Creason. A beautiful silver serving dish was presented to Mrs. Samuels, the outgoing president, in appreciation of her services to the state by the Tacoma City Federation.

A representative of Gov. Roland Hartly made a few remarks.
