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"ARROW TIPS" By Kits Reid

The Advocate does not necessarily share in Kits Reid's views, but whether we do or not, her opinions are sane, and logical and well worth reading. It is your privilege as well as ours to disagree with Kits and she invites your opinion upon subjects she discusses from time to time in her column.

Will some one of the judges please condescend to explain to us poor employers who pay their salaries just what strange malady has taken possession of them? Just what influence is at work that persuades them to render such extreme verdicts as have been handed out the past few months. It began with that insane sentence by Judge Tazewell last spring of 25 years for a 3 young man who had robbed a filling station. It was followed by another recently by Judge Stevenson, who gave a boy of 19 a sentence of 20 years for a hold-up. A judge in another part of the state gives a man 50 years old a 20 year sentence for forging checks.

The Oregon prison has over 700 prisoners in it. Its capacity is 450 occupants. It has shut within its walls boys of 17, 18, 19 and 20, sentenced to spend years with older and more hardened criminals. What chance for any reformative influences have they, doomed to endure an abnormal life for so many years. What is the sense of a 10 year sentence when a 5 year sentence has already exhausted the punishment possibilities. I am forced to the conclusion that these wise judges of ours have forgotten to count the days that enter into a sentence. Having entered upon this orgy of cruelty because they have, tasted of the power, their obsession is in full swing and God pity the boys and men who are caught in the toils of the law.

I am no sentimentalist. I believe that a law breaker should be punished, but after a study of the sentences being handed out by the judges in this state, I think it is about time some one pointed out to them their enormity of their offense against common sense and justice. "I don't care what you say about it. That is the law and I shall give him the limit", said one of our judges who wants reelection. This attitude of revenge as typified in this judge, does not speak well for the intelligence of that gentleman. He did not want to be bothered. He even so says that the harsh laws were framed by men who deliberately set about it, were sent to the legislature for that purpose—to get thru a law out of revenge. Any one who knows the method of working at the legislature knows how easy it is to do that sort of thing. The harsher the law for criminals, the easier it is to pass it. Oregon's laws are not founded on reformation of the wrongdoer—his punishment is the only thing desired. Our type of Christianity is the hanging kind—at least the recent obsession of extreme sentences would so indicate.
