They may vote for the Republican Party candidates or the Democratic Party candidates in the election if they choose but they are deprived of helping select candidates in the primaries. This sort of treatment of American citizens is a violation of the provisions of the United States constitution, nevertheless it is enforced to the letter, by both parties in the Southern States. Why blame the colored voters for supporting men and not parties.

CHURCH NOTES

MT. OLIVET CHURCH LAUNCHES BIG RALLY

The pastor and officers of Mount Olivet Baptist Church announce the launching of a \$2000 rally to reduce the mortgage indebtedness of their church, beginning Sunday, October 21, and closing Sunday, November 18. Twenty groups of workers have been assessed quotas of \$100 and have been asked to report the same in installments of \$20 on each of the five Sundays of the campaign. Other clubs and organizations in the city have been asked to assist financially in the general campaign.

Buttons will be worn by the authorized solicitors and books in which contributors can subscribe their name and the amounts will be placed in the hands of the 20 groups as well as cards of persons who are to be especially solicited.

MEMORIAL TABLET

A memorial tablet of some enduring material will be erected and placed in the front vestibule of the church containing the names of the club, team or individual worker that secures the sum of \$100 during this drive. A large thermometer, 10 feet tall, placed on the outside of the church will announce to the general public and passer-by the progress of the campaign. On the inside there will be two boards that will register the progress of the 20 different groups, one containing the names of the men who are leading and the other the names of the women who are leading. SUNDAY NIGHT PROGRAMS

The campaign committee will arrange special programs for each of the five Sunday nights of the drive that will be a departure from the regular night service in order that the team workers and general public may feel free to get into the spirit of the rally, without doing violence to any religious scruples that they may have regarding the converting of the regular worship service into a report meeting. The program will be of a sacred order, but will in no sense be religious, as those formerly held on Sunday nights. The arrangement will avoid criticisms that follow often in the wake of excesses committed during rallies in churches. The campaign committee is considering other features that will be announced later.

Dr. Gaston, who just recently headed up the drive for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, is anxious to have the same generous support in this rally as was given in the other movement and expresses himself as being thoroughly satisfied that the results will be just as encouraging as those in the former drive.

"Even persons who are not members of Mt. Olivet are asked to watch the progress of our campaign, and fall into line with the spirit of the effort," said he.
