"ARROW TIPS"

The Advocate does not necessarily share in Kita Reid's views, but whether we do or not, her opinions are sane, and logical and well worth reading. It is your privilege as well as ours to disagree with Kita and she invites your opinion upon subjects she discusses from time to time in her column.

If Hoover is beaten in this campaign, it will be by his loving lady friends. Just what can be the thought in the minds of the national committee to allow such goings on? First comes Mrs. Mabel Wilebrandt, from the attorney general's office. Will someone please tell me just by what ethical standard a publicity paid official of the U. S. government can take the time for which she is paid by the taxpayers, to electioneer for a candidate for public office? It might be all right if she has leave of absence, but it is certainly all wrong if she is doing it on her working time. In addition to the above, I would like to know why she has waited all this time to enforce the prohibition law in N. Y. City? She has been in office several years and this is the first time we have heard of any such activity on her part. It simply emphasizes my statement in these columns a couple of weeks ago that for eight years the Republican party has had control of the law enforcement machinery and look at the state of affairs—just look at it for one minute! From the city police authorities clear up the line to the attorney general of the national government, the result of non-enforcement are the same. Mrs. Wilebrandt, arise and explain why this sudden activity and why did you pass by the Philadelphia situation?

Next on the list comes the women of the National Woman's Party. Why does Hoover repudiate their support? Does he think for one moment that his tacit approval of their endorsement will hold for him the votes of the millions of working women in this country, who have struggled and starved (some of them) for legislation that will give them shorter hours and better working conditions? Does he think that organized labor will stand by such tactics? If he wants to be guided by the approval of a lot of women who never worked a day in stores, factory, laundry, etc., I want to say right here, in plain every-day English, that he must be expecting that the owners of those industries will use coercive methods again and force their workers to vote that ticket. They did it to elect Coolidge and they may try it again to elect Hoover. But eight years of co-operation of the government with Big Business, has brought about a state of affairs in the industrial life of this country, which has set people think-

ing—especially the workers. It is a slow task to arouse the workers to any definite political thinking as long as they are on a job, but—just let them join the unemployed army and they have nothing else to do but think!

And here in Oregon, the Republican party has adopted Mrs. Thompson. Of all the women in the state, she has the least influence among the voting women. She has played herself out among the club women through her quarrelsome tactics. She has a most unattractive temper, and her long, many disagreements with her own party, the Democrats, should have warned the Republicans that she cannot "pull votes" from that group. But that is not id Reid's responsibility, but it makes my Republican blood boil just a little bit. It is being so rapidly cooled thru the various blunders that Hoover and the national committee is making that I'm very much afraid I shall have to vote for Thomas.

Let us look at Hoover's labor policy for a few minutes. Let us examine his theories on the unemployment—the use of injunctions as sanctioned by the Supreme Courts of the land, in which the whims of the judge becomes the law—prohibiting the worker the right of appeal. Although every thug, slug-ugly, forger, bootlegger and murderer in the land has such a right. Do you remember the decision the cut-stone workers' case some years ago in which the judge not only allowed an injunction against the workers striking but went so far as to enjoin the workers from quitting their jobs—under penalty of imprisonment? Mr. Hoover has so little to say about this abuse of the fundamental rights of American workers that we are expecting no help from him on that score.

As to unemployment—he says some things but nothing definite. He does seem to accept vague and inaccurate figures, both as to the number of men out of jobs, as well as the wage situation. He tells us that at one time the U. S. Bureau of Labor estimated about 1,800,000 workers out of jobs. But the real number is nearer 4,000,000. Does he say anything about unemployment insurance? No! Does he say anything about old age pensions? No! Does he say anything about sickness insurance? No! We may attach some significance to his reference to "doles to the idle and other measures of desperation." But he leaves open a very grave opportunity for a challenge as to his interest in the whole out-of-work situation.

He seems to have an abiding faith in the prosperity of Coolidge and Mellon. Well, it is perfectly natural that an engineer who has become a politician should forget the hard, weary path trod by the worker. It is perfectly natural that with his future assured as to his bank account, which we understand, is a very comfortable one, with his future as to his life's ambition encouraged by such men as Mellon, Moses et al, he should be rather careless in expressions of encouragement to the common people. I suppose we should be charitable toward him considering such a halo over his head—it may be aluminum, but a halo it is—but rather stained with oil. This is just a list of things that should be considered by every man and woman worker in this country before any voting.

For heaven's sake, workers—THINK!
