Speaking of censorship—seldom have I been so thrilled as I was by the sermon preached last week by Rabbi Berkowitz at Temple Beth Israel. He chose for his text the book recently published "You Can't Print That" by George Seldes who was a war correspondent. For courage, original thinking and general all round desire that hi people should know what is going on in the world, I commend to your notice, the young Jewish rabbi. Would that we had more of his kind in Portland pulpits. Seldes gives us the inside of the war obsession. He tells us things which rob us of all admiration of Mussolini. He makes us wonder how the United States financiers were hoodwinked as to loans—if indeed they were hoodwinked. I doubt it. He tells us of the tyranny of our masters. Get the book—read it and wonder at the stupidity of us all. I wonder when we will wake up. Not as long as we are comfortably fed and clothed and housed.

I wish I could have heard Richard Montague at the League of Women Voter's luncheon the other day. He spoke on the "Power of the Press." I have a great admiration for Mr. Montague. He is a clear thinker, not afraid to express his views (which are too close to conservatism to suit me). He has what is called "a sane forceful mind." I'll bet two cents, however, that he does not find his best reading on public questions in the daily newspapers. He is on the Public Library Board. I wish he would get after the library—there is something wrong there in the policies. I wonder if the Board knows all the things which are happening?

Dear, dear, our Royal Family at the City Hall is in a fix. Now cometh Kenneth Harlan and he wants more money for further investigation of rates. And the king and his counselors say "wait my son, until we hear from the public service commission. In the meantime, we have the cheerful news that New York traction interests must starve along on a five cent car fare while we are told here that in order to make any money our P. E. P. Company may find it necessary to increase our eight cent rate. I wonder if Harlan goes on investigating—and telling the people what he finds—if the Royalty will dare send forth such an edict. story of the Game Bird, is in itself a long and interesting one. Those who would like to know more of these Game birds would do well to get the Biennial Report of the Game Commission of the State of Oregon, 1927-1928. The Game Commission, Broadway 0778 in the Oregon Building, the Public Library and Mr. Elliott at the Y. M. C. A. Beacon 6161, will be pleased to give additional information.

Here's the list of "some" Oregon birds. There are seventy of them and they are commonly found about Portland:

Bob-white quail, Mountain quail, Scotty Grouse, Oregon Ruffed Grouse, China Pheasant, Coopers Hawk, Western Red-tail Hawk, Bessert Sparrow Hawk, Sharp shinned Hawk, Pigeon Hawk, Bald Eagle, Short-eared Owl, Kennicott's Screech Owl, Pacific Horned Owl, Pygmy Owl, Harris' Woodpecker, Gairdner's woodpecker, Red-breasted Sapsucker, Northern Pileated Woodpecker, Northwestern Flicker, Streaked Horned Lark, Coast Jay, California Jay, Western Crow, Western Meadow Lark, Brewer's Blackbird, California Purple Finch, Pine Siskin, Rusty Song Sparrow, Oregon Towhee, Audubon Warbler, Seattle Wren, Western Winter Wren, California Creeper, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Oregon Chickadee, Chestnut-back Chickadee, Bush-tit, Western Golden-crowned Kinglet, Golden-crowned Sparrow, Oregon Junco, Townsend's Fox Sparrow, Oregon Junco, Townsend's Fox Sparrow, Pipit, Ruby crowned Kinglet, Alaska Hermit Thrush, Varied Thrush, Morning Dove, Band-tailed Pigeon, Turkey Vulture, Marsh Hawk, Osprey, Belted Kingfisher, Lewis Woodpecker, Rufous Hummingbird, Northwestern Red-wing Vesper Sparrow, Nuttall's Sparrow, Western Chipping Sparrow, Shufeldt's Junco, Violet Green Swallow, Yellow Warbler, Lutescent Warbler, Black throated Grey Warbler, McGillivray's Warbler, Pacific Yellow-throat, Western House Wren, Western Robin and Western Bluebird.

Now all these birds are not seen the year around. They are like people, they come go—travel about here and there. Some of them have summer homes in the north and winter homes in the south in order to save high fuel bills, etc. Bust for a fuller account of them, their residence in Oregon, their mating season, etc, etc, at the Public Library, first floor, children's department.

This little game bird is constantly growing more popular with the sportsmen. Increase rapid in Eastern Oregon. Difficult to produce at first, but Game farmers have made a careful study of this bird and the results have been good. A good supply is now on hand.

Wild Turkeys

In 1926, the first planting of wild turkey was made in Oregon. Curry County was chosen for the planting. Since that time a large increase in the birds has been made. It is believed that in time the wild turkey will become a popular bird with the sportsmen of the state, but investigation has shown that they must be planted in remote sections where they can not contact with domestic turkeys.

Chinese Pheasants

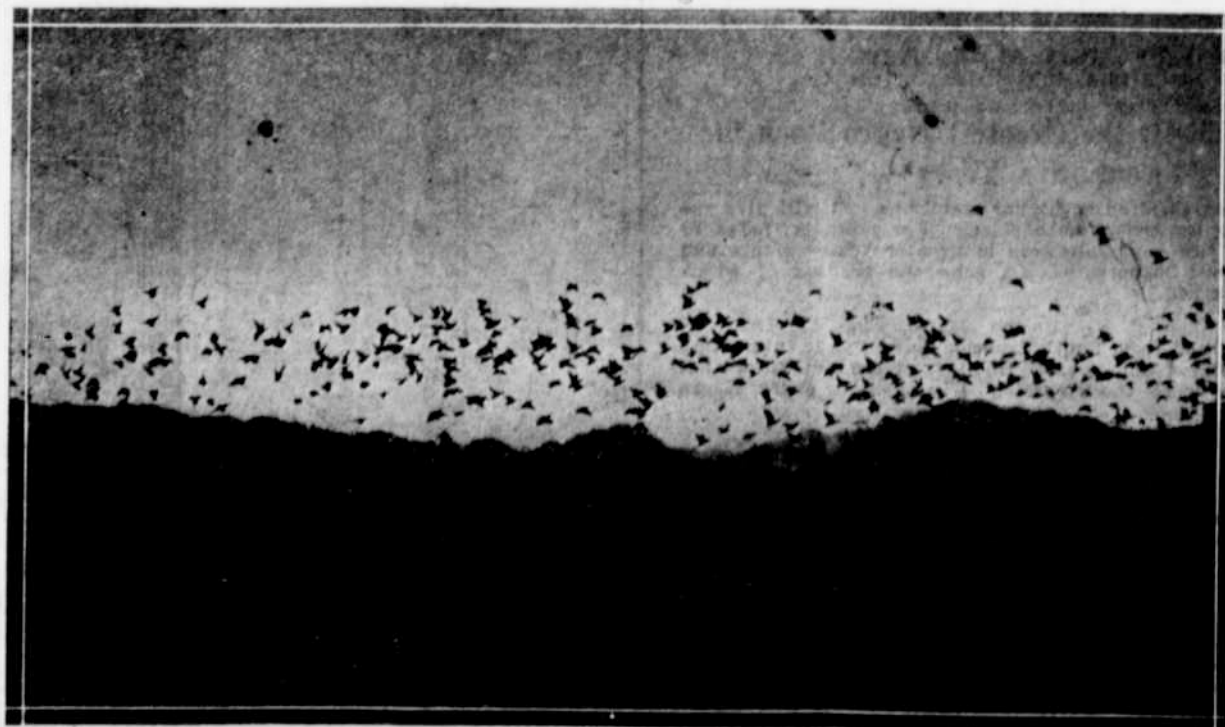
Introduced from China in 1881 by Judge Denny of Salem, Oregon, now common in cultivated areas over most of the State west of the Cascades. Nests from April to July, in open fields; laying from seven to twelve eggs. In Eastern Oregon these game birds are increasing and in several counties in the eastern part of the state, due to plantings by the department from birds produced at the three farms.
