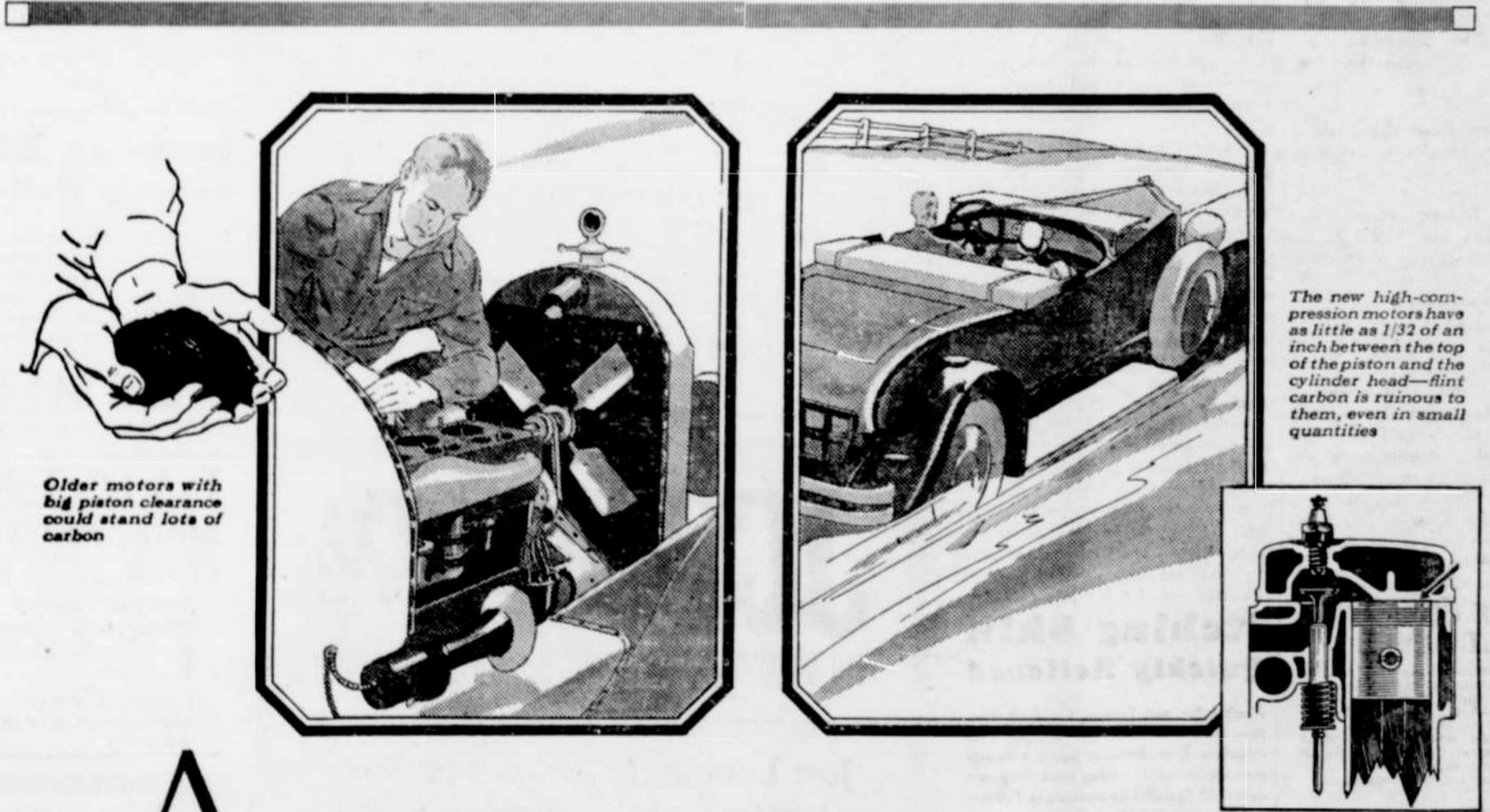
## Spanish-American War Vets Send Delegate to Denver
