Whoever writes those editorials in the Oregonian on crimes, criminals and prisons seems to have overlooked the big reason for establishing those bits of hell known as American prisons. I mean the reform—the rehabilitation feature. He thinks that the nearer we can come to the inferno—after making it reasonably decent—the quicker we can turn bad citizens into good ones. Granted that the criminal who is so unfortunate as to be caught should be segregated so that the rest of us can be protected against his further depredations. What chance for repentance is there for him in the American prison as we know it today. The judge gives him a cruelly long sentence and he goes to a place where every effort is made to strip him of any desire to be a man. He is placed under the care of guards not notorious for anything but brutal instincts—the rougher—the nearer they are to the moron grade themselves—the better guards they are supposed to be. If fear is to be the largest factor in the scheme of prison management why wouldn't it be better to go back to the old punishments of the days of Genghis Kahn when a man was dismembered a joint at a time beginning with the little finger joints. I wonder what has inspired those prison editorials—

Garvey Convention Opens With Prayer To God and Geneva

American Members Oppose New House of Garvey Movement

Kingston, Jamaica, Aug. 8, (CNS)—Ldewise Park was packed with curious natives this morning when the Sixth Convention of the Universal Negro Improvement Association opened here with divine services, which was attended by the Mayor and members of the Kingston Corporation who, apparently agreed that so long as the Garveyites contented themselves with praying to God and petitioning the imperialist League of Nations no real action would be taken by them towards the liberation of the African races and therefore the oppressors need have no fear.

Social Equality Between Whites and Negroes Called Unscriptural

New York, Aug. 8, (CNS)—Social equality between whites and Negroes was assailed as an unscriptural and impossible ideal, and Representative De Priest was bitterly denounced as destructive of racial good-will in a sermon last night by the Rev. John W. Ham, pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle in Atlanta, Ga., speaking as visiting preacher at the First Baptist church, Broadway and 79th Street.
