DIGESTING THE NEWS

Some weeks ago this column asserted that the Honorable Oscar DePriest, our Congressman from the 1st Illinois Congressional District, politically speaking, was giving greater inspiration and doing more for his race, during the past year, than any other race politician, and among other things written, the following is quoted therefrom:

*****What Oscar DePriest has accomplished is a matter of a very definite calculation*****He has shown us how to successfully organize for political betterment. In his travels and lectures throughout the country he has left a trail of determined effort and has, more than any one individual inspired others to organize and achieve for themselves political recognition. Even in the instances where candidates lost, the race has been given consideration that they otherwise would not have received.*****In fact this column can and possibly will, at a later date, devote many columns to definite instances of political gain for all of which DePriest has been the inspiration.*****

This column, this week, will be devoted to a few of the more prominent and nationally known efforts of the race towards securing a political foothold, and all as the result of intensive and efficient organization, at least patterned after the system DePriest has and is using, and which he is constantly urging his hearers to adopt and perfect. While there are some who, probably, will deny that DePriest has been an inspiration, nevertheless, he has been. The Negro is noted for his alertness and persistence in imitating others and whether the individual cares to admit or deny, the fact remains that in applying DePriest's methods the latter must be given some credit, although his inspiration may have been entirely unconscious to the individual.

In presenting this digest of the various race candidates, no mention is made of the many elective positions now held by race members who have been nominated to succeed themselves; nor of the great many who, while defeated, made a splendid race in recent primaries in various parts of the country; neither is mention made to strictly local efforts, confining our digest to those positions, where success at the polls will bring the candidate into national repute.

Waltham M. Moore, the first race man to be a member of the Missouri State Legislature, and a resident of St. Louis, will attempt to wrest the republican nomination for United States Congressman from the 12th Congress-

lional District, including that portion so thickly populated by the race in St. Louis, from the present Congressman L. C. Dyer.

For a seat in the upper house of the state legislature we have two candidates. J. W. Willis, Sr., of Cleveland, Ohio has been assured of the backing of both colored republican league and the regular party organization in his race to become a State Senator from Cleveland.

In Detroit, Michigan, a race lawyer, Charles A. Roxborough, is seeking the nomination for State Senator on the republican ticket for the 3rd senatorial district.

In addition to our thirteen members now serving in the lower house of legislature in eight different states, some of whom will be up for re-election, the following also will run:

Attorney Louise Pridgeon, of Cleveland, Ohio, backed by the colored republican league and regular party organization.

Attorney William B. Bush, of Cincinnati, Ohio, the first of our race to be backed by the regular republican organization for several years.

Saint Clair Gibson, of Dayton, Ohio to run on an independent ticket.

Attorney John A. Davis, of St. Louis, Mo., to be a candidate for the republican nomination. He served one term, four years ago.

Dr. A. B. Lattimore, of Boston, Mass., to be a candidate from ward nine, being backed by the colored wing and the regular democratic party organization.

Harry Bragg, of New York City, an employee in the office of the City Tax Commission, is being groomed by F. Q. Morton, the colored democratic leader and civil service commissioner, to run in the 21st district for the State Assembly.

In addition to Judge A. B. George, running for re-election in Chicago, the race will have six other candidates for a judgeship.

Alexander H. Martin, of Cleveland, Ohio, to run for Judge of the Common Pleas Court, on the republican ticket.

Attorney Eugene Clarkson Jennings of Los Angeles, California, will be a candidate in the August Primaries for Judge of Superior Court.

Assemblyman Francis E. Rivers and Alderman John Clifford Hawkins, of New York City, will be the republican nominees for the two Municipal Court Justices of the 10th district.

Assistant Corporation Counsel J. S. Watson and Attorney Charles E. Toney, of New York City, are being backed by F. Q. Morton, as the democratic nominees for Justices of the Municipal Court.






SHANTUNG GOLF FROCK


