LILIAN GISH WOULD BE ROBESON'S 'DESDEMONA'

'ORDER OF BLACK SHIRT' RAPPED BY MAYOR

WHITE ACTRESS SAYS THERE IS NO DIFFERENCE

Famous Movie Star Will For-sake the Screen and Play Desdemona Opposite Paul Robeson.

New York, Sept. 4.—The question of whether Paul Robeson will play "Othello" in America has been settled insofar as finding a distinguished white woman actress to play Desdemona opposite him is concerned.

Lillian Gish, celebrated motion picture actress, who has been a screen leading woman 17 years, announced to newspapermen Saturday when she arrived from Europe aboard the French liner Paris that: "If his (Mr. Robeson's) 'Othello' is better than any other actor's, as I have heard, then, naturally, I would play in 'Othello' with him."

This statement from Miss Gish has settled a much mooted question that has caused excited comment and gossip ever since Robeson achieved international praise for his portrayal of "Othello" in London last spring. Opposite Mr. Robeson in London was Miss Peggy Ashcroft, noted white English actress, who said she felt no different in allowing Robeson to play with her than if he were a white actor. Mr. Robeson will appear in concert in Portland early in the spring in the Steers-Coman series.

MEIER PROMISES TO PATTERN PLATFORM OF THE LATE SENATOR GEORGE W. JOSEPH

Julius Meier, independent candidate for governor made a stirring speech

over the radio station KEX Thursday evening. For thirty minutes he outlined his policy making it clear that he had accepted without alteration the complete platform of the late Senator Joseph, Republican nominee for gov-

ernor. He made it clear that the regulatory machinery of the public service commission made it utterly impossible for the commission to function in a way beneficial to the peoples' best interests. Therefore he advocates the abolition of Public Service Commission. He urged the public development of the water power industry as against private ownership and warned the people again and again that the big program of publicity, bonds, etc. prosecuted by the private interests were being paid for by the "tribute of higher rates." He urged the people to develop Oregon's water power for the benefit of themselves and their children. He assailed the Morning Oregonian as the mouthpiece of the private interests and as misrepresenting him and his candidacy. He said its policy was to rule or ruin. He urged the voters to read the Oregonian so that they might be advised how it stood on measures and men so they could vote to the contrary. Mr. Meier promised if elected that he would endeavor to get through the legislature such legislation as would be necessary to make his platform operative for the benefit of the people and the development and progress of the state.

REV HILL RETURNS TO PORTLAND

Rev. Daniel G. Hill, Jr., pastor of Bethel A.M.E. Church was the speaker last Sunday afternoon at the PUGST Sound Annual Conference held at Pocatello, Idaho. His subject was, "The Church and Problems of Youth." Other ministers from the coast who were on the program were Rev. J. B. Isaacs and Rev. Runyon. Rev. Hill received special commendation for the report from Bethel. With the exception of two there were no changes made in appointments. The two were Rev. L. B. Stewart, transferred to the California Conference and Rev. Pointer sent from Bremerton to Butte. Bremerton is open. Rev. Hill will leave in a few days for Pasadena, California where he will deliver the educational address next Friday evening before the California Conference.

SOUTHERN SENATOR RETIRED TO PRIVATE LIFE

Columbia, S. C., Sept. 10.—Nearly complete returns in the Democratic run-off primary indicated today that Senator Cole L. Blease, self-styled "drinking prohibitionist" and condoner of lynching, had been returned to private life. Former Congressman James F. Byrnes had a majority of 4970 votes with only 42 of the state's 1528 precincts yet to be heard from. Blease was not expected to overcome this lead. The vote was Byrnes 119,310, Blease 114,340. Blease raised the Negro issue during the campaign by declaring lynching was the only way to stop Negro attacks on white women. Byrnes, if complete returns do not alter his position, is assured of election as Democratic nominee.

SAYS NATIONS WANT NO WAR

Berlin, Germany Aug. 21, 1930

To the Editor: For the last two days a quotation from "July 14" by a German writer, Emil Ludwig, has been almost constantly in my mind. In speaking of the World War he tells "how a peaceable, industrious, sensible mass of 300,000,000 people was hounded . . . into a war which was in no way destined nor inevitable." During these two days we have come into contact with representatives of at least three of the nations that twelve years ago were at each other's throats and now that the "fever fit" is over, the old relations of business and social and political intercourse have been revived. At English Plymouth we put ashore both mail and passengers. Among the oncoming passengers were two students who were returning to their German homes after a vacation in England as members of a "Holiday Fellowship," one of the organizations helping to prevent war by promoting exchanges of teachers and students from different countries. The father of one of the boys was in the war two years and is training his boy in the way of peace rather than war.

At French Cherbourg, two German vessels and one American were receiving and discharging passengers and mails as if nothing has ever happened to their peaceful relationships. Now, after two days in Germany, among our former enemies, where we have been received with every courtesy we wonder if these "sensible, industrious, peace loving people" are the ones we wanted to murder a few years ago because we were made to believe they were boiling down the bodies of their dead soldiers for fat and were cutting off the hands of Belgian boys or because they and their rulers alone of all the peoples and

THREE ORGANIZATIONS URGE "REIGN OF SO. PREJUDICE"

Ku Klux Klan, Caucasian Crusaders, and the American Fascisti Agitate Uprising.

Atlanta, Ga., (CNS)—The American Fascisti Order of Blackshirts, the White Band of Caucasian Crusaders and the Ku Klux Klan are the three organizations in the South around which racial agitation is centering, and upon which southern prejudice depends for the "supremacy" of the Caucasian in America.

All three have their headquarters in this city and make indefinite claims as to their strength outside of Georgia. The American Fascisti is the youngest of the three and is still in the formation process and its application for a charter as an organization "to inculcate and foster in the minds of the members and the public generally, white supremacy," is still pending in the courts. It claims to have 15,000 applications for membership. Its membership, like that of the Klan, is largely secret; its meetings are secret and the only officer known is H. J. Gewinner, spokesman for the "adjutant-general's office." R. O. Gordon, R. S. Guldredge and H. J. Gewinner applied for the organization's charter. The membership is open to any white male citizen over the age of 18, regardless of religion or creed. One organizer said, "all one needs is a white skin, a white

heart and a black shirt."

Negroes Under Attack
The organization aimed its first blow at Communism but soon turned to the Negro. Now it is holding frequent meetings in Atlanta denouncing the employment of Negroes while white men are idle. It has begun a campaign to get jobs for white men and claims to have displaced 500 Negroes in Atlanta business houses with white help. Threat of boycott is used to obtain this end when persuasion fails. The campaign "jobs for white men" is popular with some working men, because unemployment is greater among the white workers than among the Negroes, it is claimed.

"Black Shirt" Banned

Athens, Ga., Sept. 4.—Mayor A. G. Dudley has issued an order prohibiting the American Fascist organization from selling its publication, "The Black Shirt," on the streets of the city.

In a statement accompanying his order the mayor said the organization "has no right to dictate to employers of labor." He said further: "Such an anti-social, anti-racial organization, apparently set up for the personal profit of its organizers, will not be tolerated in the community."

JUSTICE MCBRIDE DIES AT 82

Thomas Allen McBride, 82, senior member of the State Supreme Court, died at his home last Tuesday night following an illness of two weeks. Justice McBride suffered a stroke of cerebral thrombosis immediately after his return from vacation at Foley Hot Springs and never recovered. Justice McBride was a native Oregonian and had many friends among the colored people who mourn his passing. His funeral was held Friday.
