## No Rights

In Pueblo, Colorado the other day more than fifty colored men were arrested on suspicion after three had been accused of raping a "pretty white woman." Colored men were arrested while sitting in barber chairs; while walking down the streets and some were even picked out of bed and hurried into the city jail. Even after three men confessed that they had a "date" at a house of prostitution with the white woman, the men were held. After the confession, the officials sought the "assaulted" woman, but she and her husband had skipped town for fear of being arrested on a charge of prostitution. And it was only the quick spitting away of the three men who had the "date" that prevented a lynching as a mob formed around the jail for that purpose. Even law-abiding, if they be colored, have no rights, it seems, when a white woman, regardless of her character, decides to accuse one of "raping" and "assaulting" her.

It is with a deal of interest that we note the continued venture into business of colored people. We hope, however, that those who go into business have weighed carefully all sides of the question because we have seen so many start out auspiciously only to close their doors within a very short time. One cannot hope to make money when first entering business. Sometimes it takes a long time before anything can be realized from a business. It takes hard work and close attention to make any kind of a business succeed in these days of close competition. We congratulate all those who take the step.

## Senator Blease

No class of people will be more elated over the recent defeat of Senator Cole Blease of South Carolina than the colored race, particularly the Negro. In his recent campaign, the main plank in his platform was lynching as a means of "protecting white womanhood of the south from the Negroes." He was credited with advocating "to hell with the Constitution" if the Constitution interfered with Mr. Blease's ideas regarding the methods to be employed for the "protection of white womanhood of the south." In the defeat of this arch enemy of human rights and equality of rights, do we read the hand writing on the wall for others of his kind occupying high places who think that the Negro has no rights that a white man need respect.

Not all the heated pre-election arguments are to be found amongst the candidates themselves but others are having their bouts. Witness the West-Kellaher episode recently published in the Daily Journal.

## Has He Kept Faith?

The Republican National Committee has issued a ponderous pamphlet consisting of 49 pages, pointing with pride to the fact President Hoover has kept faith with the American people, and has lived up to the 1928 platform of his party. In one column appear the various pledges in the Kansas City platform and in another appear statements telling how the president has made good on them. In one instance however, a blank space is noticeable opposite the pledge. It is the pledge regarding the Negro plank. The platform promised the enactment of anti-lynching legislation by Congress. The space remains blank—there has been no anti-lynching legislation and lynching goes merrily on in the south, while President Hoover has lifted his voice only once publicly against the national evil and that upon earnest solicitation by the N.A.A.C.P.

That was a wonderful speech delivered by Julius Meier over the radio Thursday outlining his stand on the issues of the campaign, particularly the power situation in Oregon.

## Lynchings

Why would the fact that a mob lynched colored men the other day who had been accused of robbery occasion any great surprise? Haven't mobs been lynching innocent Negroes and Negroes guilty of no crime at all for the last 40 years? More than 4000 known lynchings have been held during the past 40 years in Christian America and less than 16 per cent of the victims were even charged with the usual alibi for lynching—rape.

For once "Old Jupe" stayed behind the scenes during the annual Fall Opening held by the downtown merchants. The artistic window displays attracted large crowds as an arch-lamp attracts moths. And every one expressed delight with the 1931 styles. Black and white are still the leads.

## No Room in the Inn

An efficient, regularly registered colored chiropodist has applied for office space in practically every downtown office building and has been turned away on account of his race, according to the reason given to him by the managers of the buildings.

We wonder if this fact wouldn't be good advertising stuff for the On-T-Oregon advertising campaign. It might attract more such folk as Cole Blease of S.C. We also wonder what the N.A.A.C.P. local branch is doing. Once upon a time, the branch had a leadership which somehow ironed and straightened out some of these injustices.

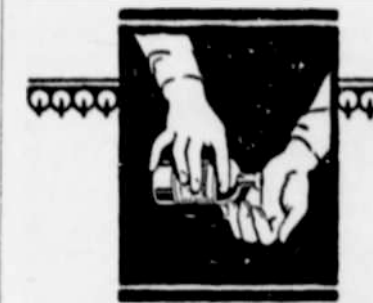
