**DIGESTING THE NEWS**

Negroes, everywhere in America, are protesting, pleading and praying for more and better opportunities in the employment field. Hard times have, however, shown them the fallacy of expecting any material gain by merely protesting and pleading, especially when the whites, who control the jobs, have so many of their own numbers clamoring for work. Our prayers, then, are about to be answered but only through increased faith in our economic and commercial leaders.

Our leaders are pointing out our economic weaknesses and directing our efforts to overcome them but it is our students of today who now have the opportunity of becoming our successful merchants, bankers, financiers and industrial magnates of tomorrow.

In our peculiar racial predicament it is not a question of opening up new avenues of endeavor but one of providing trained and experienced men and women in a field already in existence but sadly neglected. The opportunity is there but it takes the trained student to grasp it.

We are well represented in the professions, arts, sciences, religious, cultural and social spheres and the student who is now entering into them would do well to consider the advantages and opportunities for the skilled business administrator. In this latter field, from a racial viewpoint, the expert will meet with less competition and enjoy greater opportunities, than in any other.

No longer must we believe that just being a Negro with a sufficient capital to open a commercial enterprise that our success is assured, not even in a Negro district. It takes a keen, trained and experienced business administrator. We want to patronize our own color, certainly, but we also want and should receive, the same courteous and efficient service, the same quality of merchandise and at an equally as low, if not lower, price than the successful white merchant offers. On no other basis will the Negro succeed as a merchant and this applies equally as well to the other allied forms of commercial and industrial enterprises.

The cynical student, after noting the absence of racial commercial enterprises in his own community, might question the wisdom of embarking on a concentrated study of business administration and economics but there are ample assurances for the success of our students who thoroughly master this subject, realizing that their academic knowledge gives them only the basic principles and an understanding upon which to building for

ultimate success through continued studies and application in the school of actual experience.

As a race we will progress commercially when we combine the services of trained and experienced business administrators and economists with our

surplus dollars now possessed by those who are already convinced that Negro enterprises manned by skilled administrators is the answer to our prayer, protests and pleadings, for more and better jobs.

From this digest it should therefore be apparent that the Negro student of today is really blessed with opportunities if he will studiously prepare himself for them. He must remember that this is the age of specialization and keen competition. A knowledge of his neighbor's present condition is just as essential as the knowledge of ancient history. To speak on terms of financial, industrial and commercial fluency is far more useful than to know the dead languages. To be able to prepare and read an intelligent and comprehensive financial report is more practical than to be able to prepare or read an essay on Hermaclides. And above all, the knowledge that the student is well trained in business administration is a more powerful claim on which to expect the whites to employ us in their own business than is a mere plea on the basis of race representation.
