Quaker City Gets Shortterm Loan by Telephone at Record Low Price

When the City Treasurer of Philadelphia informed the Controller, not long ago, that the city treasury was bare of ready each, the latter official at once undertook a telephone campaign to replenish the city's finances. Calling a score of bond houses in New York, Boston, and elsewhere, by long distance telephone, he asked for competitive bids on a \$2,000,000 short-term loan, and so successful were his negotiations that he secured the needed funds at what is re ported to be the lowest rate the city has ever obtained for a municipal short-term loan.
