The Chicago *Aec* in an editorial of January 17th, unequivocally and fearlessly condemns the practice of lynching and offers the following as a cure: "Lynching can be ended. The best remedy is hot lead in large quantities delivered from machine guns, army rifles, cannons, revolvers, or bombs. If any commission or survey can devise a more direct, effective method, we are for it. Lynching is a radical means to an end, it must be met with radical methods."

Child workers are one element in lowering the wages of their own parents, but they are also taking jobs away from them. Where there are not enough jobs to go round, more than a million child laborers mean more than a million idle adults. Children have a right to health and growth and education and play. Set them free by giving the adults the work to do.

Garage are doing. The garage is located on Ross street just off Broadway south. It is a large brick building, modernly equipped. Is does one good to drive in there and see two very courteous and efficient black men come to wait upon you. Colored people especially and as many whites as can be influenced to do so, should patronize this place for these young men are well qualified in their line of work and as they are taken care of more places will be opened for our men to get work.
