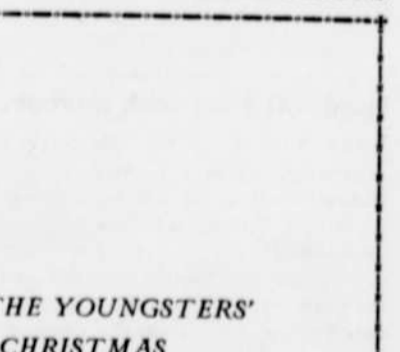
SPORTS
