### Digesting . . . The News

Next week, beginning tomorrow by certain organizations in our group, as "Negro History Week," will be an opportune time for some of our public men not only to review for the masses the accomplishments of the Negro in the past but also to point out and analyze the opportunities of the present so that the acts of the Negro today will make good history for tomorrow.

With all the weaknesses in our present social and economic system in mind we still can be proud of the achievements of our men and women who have passed on, leaving a monument and a name for themselves. When we consider the handicaps and difficulties under which they labored it is remarkable that they fared so well and as time rolls on their acts will be glorified more in "American" history and less as strictly "Negro" history.

There will come a day when all America will be proud of their little black children. What child today can suffer so many privations, denied, in many sections, equal schooling facilities, playgrounds and even the public parks and amusement centers, still the little black boy or girl goes serenely on, laughing and playing, furnishing humor, inspiration and character to our American life.

The same boy or girl, as they grow up, find themselves ostracized everywhere they go. In many sections even though they pay taxes in the same proportion as others, they are denied the use and the privilege of those very things that their tax money maintains. In many sections they cannot ride on the same train or street-car that a pet monkey or chimpanzee is welcome, except as a servant. In many sections, they cannot ride in the same passenger elevator but must go around to the back and share the freight elevator with the dogs and baggage. Still this same grown-up black boy or girl goes merrily on, dancing and playing, furnishing ridicule and amusement for others and heartaches for their sympathizers.

As this black boy or girl reaches full maturity and they view themselves in retrospect, do they become embittered because of their hardships and prejudiced handicaps and want to fight, seeking bloodshed from their oppressors? No, they smile at fate and wonder at the ironic gall of those that sing, "America, the land of the free and the home of the brave." Do they do anything that would besmirch the fair name of America? No, they pity the view-point of others and pray, in that faith that has been handed down to them, that some day all America will waken to the fact that the black boy and girl is not getting a "square deal."

Yes, we are proud of our Negro characters in history and day by day we are gaining white friends, organizations, societies and groups, who, also are proud that our blacks have acted like true American men and women, though not treated as such.

Let us hope that our public men and women, next week, will caution our people and show them how we can best improve ourselves now so that the Negro history of the future will become so meritorious that all America will claim it, as it should be, as a part of American history.
