Five o'Clock Tea Rusks

2% cups special cake flour, sifted, 4 teaspoons baking powder, % teaspoon salt. % teaspoon cinnamon, % teaspoon nuturer, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 2 tablespoons butter, or other shortening, one egg well beaten, 2-3 cup milk or water.

Sift flour once, measure, add bak-ing powder, salt, spices, and brown sugar, and sift together three times. Cut in shortening. Combine egg and liquid. Add liquid gradually until soft dough is formed. Turn on floured liquid. into balls. Place together in wellgreased shallow pan. Brush with milk, sprinkle with additional brown Bake in moderate oven degrees F.) 15 to 20 minutes. Makes two dozen small rusks.

Cream Dressing

A cooked dressing made with cream will be found excellent for serving with vegetable, meat or fish salads. Mix together one-half tablespoon salt, one-half tablespoon mustard, hree quarters tablespoon sugar and one tablespoon flour. Then add the yelks of two eggs, beaten lightly, three tablespoons melted butter, three three quarters cup of cream or rich milk and one-quarter cup vinegar. Stir constantly in double botler, cooking until the mixture becomes thick. Strain and cool.
