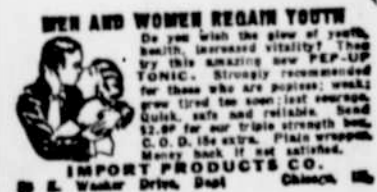

THE MOTION PICTURE SITUATION

The Advocate does not necessarily share in the writer's views, but whether we do or not, the opinions are sane, logical and interesting. It is the readers' as well as our privilege to disagree with the writer who invites your opinion upon the subjects discussed from time to time in this column.

ARTICLE NO. 6

When Will H. Hays was picked by the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America to become their president, he assured the public that he recognized the destructive moral effect of pictures that stressed the suggestive and the vulgar, and he promised "to develop to the highest possible degree the moral and educational value of the industry."

The Myers Senate resolution, which threatened a congressional investigation, the complaint and investigation began on Aug. 31, 1921, by the Federal Trade Commission, the Appleby bill in Congress for Federal Regulation of motion pictures and the New York State Motion Picture Law which went into effect Aug. 1, 1921, and the censorship laws introduced in many states, prompted the hiring of Mr. Hays, whom we all know to be an experienced politician, having been chairman of the National Republican committee.

Mr. Hays has broken his promise. He assured us as stated before, that he recognized the destructive moral effect of pictures that stressed suggestive and the vulgar, and "to develop to the highest possible degree the moral and educational value of the industry. This has not been done. The evidence I have to offer is the outpouring of objectionable films from the producers whom Mr. Hays represent-

ed, which continued unabated. Again a promise was broken, when in 1924 February 26, and on June 19, the motion picture producers and distributors of America of which Mr. Hays is president, adopted resolutions that they would not produce, distribute or exhibit or promote the production, distribution or exhibition of films based on objectionable books or plays. This promise has not been lived up to. Books banned by public libraries were used in producing films by the producers who employed Mr. Hays. The motion picture producers and distributors of America, announced through their president, Mr. Hays, that they would refrain from anti-prohibition propaganda. This promise was made in February, 1925, and has not been kept. Next week will also deal with the part Mr. Hays is playing and after that the article will treat of our own state and city of Portland.

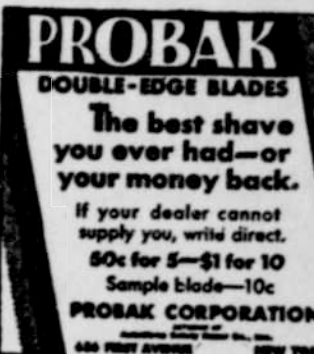
