SELECTED RECIPES

PICKLES AS GARNISHES

Do you take advantage of the tasteful little garnish? Many do not and thus lose a wonderful opportunity to impress their guests with the daintiness and deliciousness of some dish placed before them.

COCONUT STUFFING

- 2 bouillon cubes (chicken flavor)
 - 1 cup hot milk
 - 1 cup bread crumbs
 - 2 cups coconut
 - 4 tablespoons celery, finely cut or 1/4 teaspoon celery salt
 - 1 1/2 tablespoons parsley, finely cut
 - 1/4 teaspoon sage
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon onion juice
 - 1 egg, slightly beaten
 - 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- Dissolve bouillon cubes in hot milk. Combine with remaining ingredients.

- 1 cup honey
- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
- 2 cups chopped raisins
- 20 marshmallows, shredded

Boil honey, sugar and orange juice without stirring until it forms a firm ball when tried in cold water, or reaches 240 degrees F. on candy thermometer. Remove from fire and pour over the stiffly beaten egg whites. Beat until thick, add raisins and marshmallows and pour into buttered tins. Cut into squares before it hardens.
