AFRICAN WAYS OF SMOKING

Antelope horns, gourds of many species, bamboo and a hole in the ground partly filled with water are a few of the aids to smoking which have been devised by the natives of Africa and Madagascar, according to the report of the scientific expedition of the Field Museum of Natural History. The expedition, consisting of Berthold Laufer, Wilfrid D. Hamby and Ralph Linton, recently returned to the United States after having

made a study of tobacco and its uses in Africa.

They report that the plant is now chewed, smoked and snuffed all over the Dark Continent and on the neighboring island of Madagascar, although tobacco was not introduced into Africa until many years after its discovery in America. Some natives were seen to smoke tobacco through their flintlock muskets. They filled the priming-pan with tobacco and drew the smoke out through the muzzle.

To their tobacco some African tribes add jimson-weed or hemp, the latter plant being an importation from Arabia, to give their smoke an added potency.
