Under a two column bold faced heading, reading: "AWARDS HONORS AT HILLSDALE COLLEGE"

In the article a brief mention was made of their respective activities during their four years at the school, giving a brief outline of the commencement program to be held in June at which time the Governor of Michigan will be the speaker at the eighty-first annual commencement of the school.

There is not a word or inference in the entire article, outside of the pictures, of their respective races. They were merely honor graduates of the school and the only points featured were their respective scholastic accomplishments.

After all, why should any other course be necessary or expected. If it was good ethical journalism to handle this particular bit of news in the manner used why isn't it just as ethical to handle all other situations in the same manner?

Both of these boys were Americans. They attend the same school and presumably the same classes, studied the same subjects and surmounted the same scholastic problems and difficulties, each reaching the top.

There would have been nothing further gained by stressing the fact that one was colored. From the pictures this fact was perfectly obvious. Why shouldn't a colored boy excel, the same as any other, if he puts into his endeavors the same amount of study and application? It is only the best of any group that reach the top, the others are always on the bottom, regardless of color.

It is to be hoped that the white press, universally, will pattern after the example set by the Citizen Patriot and that their efforts will not be restricted merely to the meritorious efforts of the Negro but will apply likewise to the Negro's indiscretions.

FOOD POISONING—Continued

Peculiar reactions to certain foods are quite often observed. These reactions vary in susceptible individuals from the most mild itching of the skin to the most severe skin and body reactions.

The cause of these reactions is not definitely understood. They are supposedly due to some abnormally digested protein products of either meat or vegetable origin.

The symptoms vary according to individual susceptibility. Thus there is the mild to the severe itching of the skin, the skin rash showing large, reddened wheals varying in size from a dime to a quarter over all or some particular part of the body.

The defendant has asked a preliminary hearing and has indicated that he will employ an attorney to fight the case.

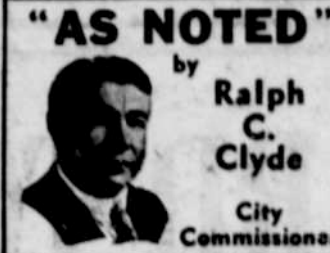
Matchmaker Walker is reported as recovering satisfactorily at his home.
