The music is "hot." They are striking up on "St. Louis Blues," known round the world. "The St. Louis Blues" were written by W. C. Handy, founder of a great music house, and famous all over the world for his "Blues."

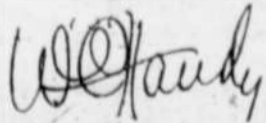
Mr. Handy's writing is that of a

man who is constantly alert. He likes to have new irons in the fire; likes to have new things to interest him. So far as his mentality is concerned he is capable of thinking just about as fast as any man can think. He is very matter-of-fact, and shows a distinct strain of literary ability.

It is this literary angle of his nature combined with a remarkable talent for music that makes it possible for him to be such an outstanding composer. He "feels" music. He somehow or another gets in touch with all that music represents, and understands what is back of it. Mr. Handy's writing does not show such remark-



able rhythm as it does real musical understanding. He has the same quality that marks the writing of Mme. Schumann-Heink; that depth of feeling that makes music more than merely a rhythmic noise.

There is a keen sense of wit in this writing, and self-reliance. Mr. Handy is not afraid to try.

Which reminds me of a young man who came to see me one day recently. He said he wanted to study aviation, but he could not. Nothing I could ask would get him to tell me why, and then I looked at his handwriting. He is afraid; not of falling, but afraid to believe in himself. He is going to go through the world saying "I can't" when he might just as well be making a success.

His friends will not tell him the truth. They may poke fun at him behind his back because he does not

get out and make a real effort, but they will not tell him the truth about himself. He asked me for the story his handwriting told, and I let him see the picture I saw.

It is going to help him amount to something. It is very good for men and women to see themselves as they really are, and your handwriting—my handwriting—tells the truth a-
