

The music is "hot." They are striking up on "St Louis Blues," known 'round the world, "The St. Louis Blues" were written by W. C. Handy, founder of a great music house, and famous all over the world for his "Blues." for his "Blues."

On my studio wall is an autographed drawing of the man who has made melody for so many. On the piano in the corner is a stack of music, and right on top there is an autographed copy of "St. Louis Blues"—with many other "Blues" underneath.

Both the photograph and the autosgraphed music were given to me by the author when I took his hand-writing and told him the story it told to me. He says that the letter I sent to him "was read by members of my family and we all agree that your reading is correct."



So far as his mentality is concerned he is capable of thinking just about as fast as any man can-think. He is very matter-of-fact, and shows a distinct strain of literary ability.

It is this literary angle of his nature combined with a remarkable tal-ent for music that makes it possible for him to be such an outstanding composer. He "feels" music.
