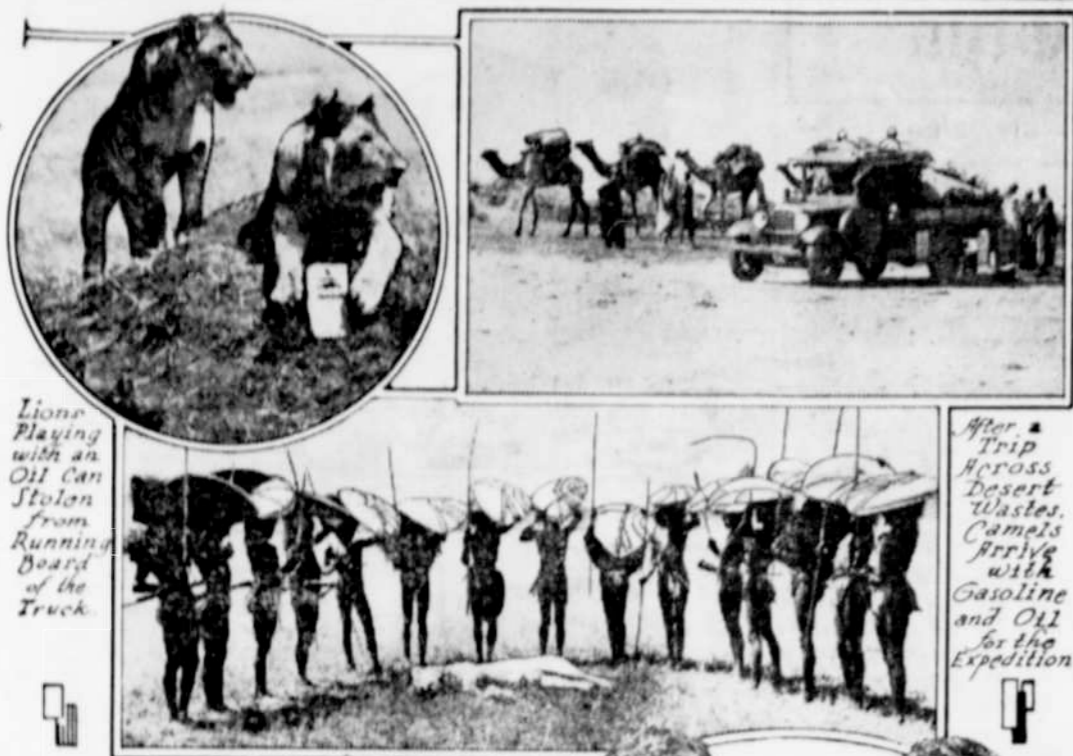


Further Secrets of the Dark Continent Unfolded in New Book

THE first east to west motor trip across Central Africa by Paul L. Hoefler, explorer, adventurer and author, recorded in his new book "Africa Speaks," illustrates in a striking manner how industry has displaced the kings and queens of the fifteenth century in making possible expeditions of explorers into hitherto unknown parts of the world.

When Mr. Hoefler's party arrived at Lagos on the Atlantic Ocean, they had completed the first East to West crossing of Central Africa by automobile. They covered a total of 12,282 miles, although the true distance from the starting point, Mombasa on the east coast to Lagos is but 5,648 miles. Numerous unforeseen obstacles were encountered. In "Africa Speaks," Mr. Hoefler tells of fashioning an axle from a lathe found at a tin mine, of having the trucks lifted bodily from a mud-hole by friendly natives, and of a swarm of locusts, "twenty-five miles wide and sixty miles long" swooping down near the camp and leaving the country desolated.
