Household Hints

Castor oil stains can be removed from washable goods by dipping in alcohol before washing.

To remove ink stains from white goods, use a solution of 1 ounce each of sal ammoniac and salts of tartar. Put in a quart bottle half full of water and shake well for several minutes; then fill bottle with water, shake again and cork. Soak the goods in this solution and then wash.
