100 SIX YEAR-OLD BOYS JOIN MOVIES

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 29.—As a new episode in motion picture history 100 Race boys aged, from 6 to 9, started to work last Thursday morning at M.G.M. studio in Director Van Dyke's new picture, "Tarzan" with the world swimming champion, Johnny Weissmuller, star.

The call came to Central Casting corporation, with specifications that they be but 50 inches tall or a little over 4 feet. Hence it fell to the lot of Chas. Butler to get them at once and he did so on schedule time, although he had to scour the whole town to do so.

At the same time they will not miss one minute of schooling, for nine tutors, including Mrs. Mattie Duckett, are to be in constant attendance. During the many waits between camera shots, movement of equipment or filming of other scenes they will be hied away to the studio school rooms and take up right where they left off in their quest of the "three Rs." Thus their education is protected as well as their bodies, as the state law requires a certain number of hours schooling per day for studio children.

As they were all lined up and marched into the studio gates physicians examined them as to eyes, teeth and general physical condition. It is memorable and in important fact in Negro vital statistics that only one little fellow was rejected, failing to pass the rigid tests because of eye weakness. The boys will take part in important sequences of the picture founded on the exciting adventures of Burrough's hero of fiction and equal to that of the average working man.

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NEGRO SINGERS MAKING CHICAGO, Nov. 30. (AP)—The artistic life of Chicago is being enlivened these days by the contributions of members of the Green Pastures Company. Churches and clubs both white and colored, are hearing members of "De Lawd" Richard B. Harrison and his understudy, Charles Winter Wood, are in demand constantly for large gatherings and frequent radio appearances are being made.

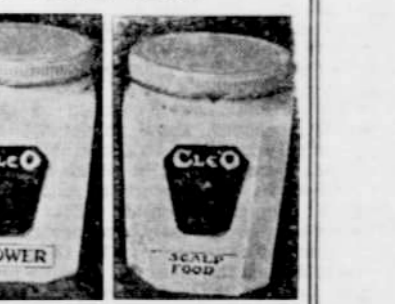
