ROBESON TOO ILL TO SING

DISAPPOINTED DEMAND REFUND

New York, Dec. 2—Paul Robeson, noted baritone singer and actor, and former football star, and who holds the degree of bachelor of laws, was to have appeared in concert on the evening of November 18, at the Royal Albert Hall, London, England but was compelled to remain in his room with a severe cold which developed into flu. The thousands who had gathered to hear the concert were visibly disappointed and many demanded the return of their admission price. An announcement was made from the stage that all money would be refunded.

Mr. Robeson is scheduled to sing in America early in February.

COUNTESS SUES JO BAKER

New York, Dec. 17—Josephine Baker is on the front pages again. This time in a suit instituted by the Countess Capulet de Bourgoin, who is known on the stage as Daisy Dihouri. The trouble grew out of the latter lady being signed as an understudy for the famous Josephine at the Casino de Paris. It was here that Jose first put on her famous banana costume and electrified Paris.

The Countess declares that she was released immediately after serving in rehearsals on the ground that she did not resemble the famous Josephine sufficiently to warrant her retention in the part. She is asking for \$4,000 damages. The young white woman is a native of Serbia. At her suggestion, the court would have seen both her and Miss Baker in the banana costume but the judge took her word for it. Countess de Bourgoin claims that Miss Baker had her dismissed because of professional jealousy.

BOOK REVIEW

"RARE EARTH"  
By Frank Owen  
(The Lantern Press, New York City)  
"And when your body's death is birth."

To soul for spring to crown, Men will not ask if that rare earth Was white flesh once, or brown. With the above verse our poet, Countess Eullen, prefaces Frank Owen's "Rare Earth."

This is not a racial book, although it contains romances of people of color. It is a philosophical book on all life, so written that the interesting romances weaved around characters of various classes and races carry the reader into a mental land of Utopia.

To quote from Owen's philosophy, the following makes a very human course of life to live: "Rise above your condition. Forget your tribulations. Learn to be tranquil, to be patient. Learn to enjoy your puddling whether it has raisins or not."

In another chapter one of Owen's characters questions his own statement: "Sometimes a man lives more greatly in a dream than in his waking hours. Who knows? How many of us, finding ourselves peculiarly handicapped, have actually learned to 'live' in dreams?"

Scobes, a blind character in "Rare Earth", roamed the earth in search of happiness and specialists or remedies that would restore his sight, only to return to his own home where he found both.

To know the meaning of real life, real happiness, read "Rare Earth".
