

Aunt Sobs, Declares "Buddie" Mob Lynched Was a Good Boy

SALISBURY, (Lynch-town) Md.—In an exclusive interview given to our reporters, Mrs. Addie Black, 503 Isabelle Avenue, aunt of Matthew Williams, told of her nephew's life.

"I had a sister, Annie Handy, who was married to Harry Williams about 1902," she said. "They had two children, Matthew and Olivia, the latter who is now 27. Matthew was born in Norfolk, Va., on February 8, 1908. When the boy was four years old, his mother died from pneumonia.

"Matthew and his sister were brought to Salisbury to live with their grandmother, Mrs. Mary Handy. The boy started to school at the age of seven, which was a year after his father, Harry Williams, died.

"He was only able to attend school until he was fourteen years of age. He was compelled to stop school to assist my mother, Mrs. Handy, as his grandfather, who had been his guardian, died. The expense in sending

him further in school was too much for his grandmother.

First Job

"The very first job that he got was at the box factory owned by Mr. Elliott. He worked there in the good season, and during the dull season, he would attend the furnaces and do various types of work for his employer and his son at their homes. Both men trusted and liked 'Buddie' as most of his acquaintances called him.

"He was never a boy who liked to run around; in fact, his whole idea was to work and save money. As far as I know, he never took a drink, and smoked only on rare occasions. He had gained a name in the community for his thrift. He seldom spent money for things other than the necessities of life. In fact, he was a fanatic for saving and tried to impress the benefit of thrift on all of his friends.

Never Mingled

"Poor Buddie never associated with the other boys his age because he felt that in doing so it was a waste of time and money. He seldom associated with the girls in the community because he thought that in being around with young women, it necessitated his spending money for their entertainment.

"Every Sunday morning, without fail, he would attend some church, John Wesley being his favorite. He never missed Sunday morning services.

"Up to this point, Mrs. Black had seemed composed, but when she attempted to relate what had gone on on the day of the lynching, tears filled her eyes.

"Buddie didn't have to go to work Friday. When I left here early Friday morning, he was playing with the younger children. He was in the best mood and seemed to be full of jokes. When I returned from work at noon, I learned that he had gone away from the house a half hour before.

Specialist for Moles

NEEDLEWORK

A set of three guest towels should make a very acceptable gift, and particularly if you make them yourself. You can buy guest toweling by the yard and do the hemstitching yourself, or you can buy the towels already made.

Those shown today are made of a fine, plain huck toweling, and the embroidered border is done in a darning stitch. This is a new idea and original with the woman who owns these towels.

It will, of course, be necessary to know the color scheme of the bathroom these are to be used in—blue, yellow, green, lavender, or rose—and then use the same design for the three towels. A single strand of mercerized floss should be used, and the work started in the center of the width of a towel and work toward both ends.

The stitches are not taken through the material, but under the little raised thread in the towel. Sometimes every other thread is taken up, and then again the floss is carried over a distance of three or four threads. One shade of floss can be used, using a different shade of the same color for each towel. Or the three towels may be done the same and one or three shades used in the design.

A Greek key design is all effective, and so would scrolls or half circles be. Be sure and use a blunt needle and you won't have any trouble picking up the threads.

Cross-stitch designs are always beautiful, particularly if a fine mesh canvas is used to embroider over. The transfer designs air out always; so a large cross-stitch, but if you waste the canvas on your material and embroider in this way the work will look much better.

Household Hints

To wash feather pillows dissolve one lb. sal soda and one-half lb. soap in one-half gallon boiling water. Put about five buckets of warm water in a tub and pour in the above solution. Next dissolve one-half lb. chloride of lime in one quart boiling water. Let it settle, then stir in tub. Beat pillows well and then put in tub, pressing down. Let them soak for an hour or more, stirring and pressing constantly with a stick. Rinse in several changes of water, wring, press out all water possible and hang on line to dry, turning and shaking them often. Choose a windy day for quick drying.

A good way to test table linen is to secure a sample and dip it in any kind of oil. The linen threads will become almost transparent, enabling one to see very readily how many cotton threads it contains.

Bermuda onions, hollowed out and steamed gently until almost tender, are delicious when stuffed with chopped liver, highly seasoned and baked for half hour.

One of the best ways to clean steel is to rub it with a paste made of emery powder and oil, mixed to the proper consistency.

Rub the fingernails over a bar of soap, allowing the soap to dry beneath the nails. This prevents dirt from accumulating under the nails.

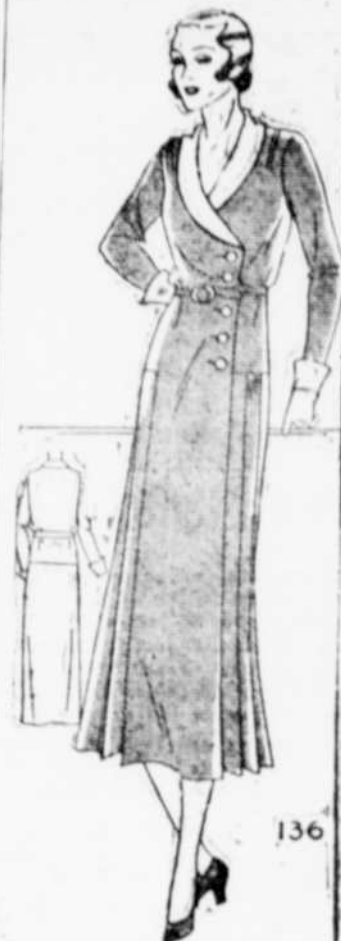
Are You Up on History?
