"PRISON OF SELF"

 The editorial by Reverend J. D. Wilson on "Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself" was very beautiful and impressive. Enough cannot be said to instill this law into the minds and hearts of the people and rid them of self-mesmerism.
 Love of self is the direct cause of all the evil in the world. It is self-love or self-gratification that causes people to steal, to lie, to bear false witness, and to murder. They will commit any crime to insure for themselves creature comforts or save themselves from physical pain, with no thought of the spiritual handicap they are forcing on themselves. It is also self-love that causes jealousy, injured feelings, and all the rest of the unattractive characteristics that are so detrimental to the highest development of man.
 The following is a quotation from Abdul Baha, the Persian Prophet and Teacher: "All the prophets were sent, all the books were revealed, that the law of love might be promoted. Let us have love and more love, a love that melts all opposition, that sweeps away all barriers, that conquers all foes, a love that abounds in charity, large-heartedness, tolerance, a noble striving, love that triumphs over all obstacles, a boundless, and irresistible, sweeping love! Ah me! Each one must be a sign of love, a center of love, a sun of love, a star of love, a palace of love, a mountain of love, a world of love, a universe of love! Hast thou love? Then thy power is irresistible. Hast thou sympathy? Then all the stars will sing thy praise."
 Again he said: "If one possesses the love of God, everything that he undertakes is useful, but if the undertaking is without the love of God, then it is hurtful and the cause of veiling one's self from the Lord of the Kingdom. But with the love of God, every bitterness is changed into sweetness and every gift becometh precious. For example, a noble striving, love that triumphs over all obstacles, a boundless, and irresistible, sweeping love! Ah me! Each one must be a sign of love, a center of love, a sun of love, a star of love, a palace of love, a mountain of love, a world of love, a universe of love! Hast thou love? Then thy power is irresistible. Hast thou sympathy? Then all the stars will sing thy praise."
 "With the love of God, all sciences are accepted and beloved, but without it, they are fruitless; rather, they are the cause of insanity. Every science is like a tree: if the fruit of it is the love of God, that is a blessed tree. Otherwise it is dried wood and finally food for fire."
 "Christ" died on the Cross, while Abdul Baha, to teach this lesson, spent his whole life in prison, forfeiting everything in this world to promote this law of love and instill it in the hearts of humanity and free them from the "Prison of Self."

 Rev. O. S. Thomas-Lewis will fill the pulpit and administer the Lord's Supper at both morning and evening services next Sunday.

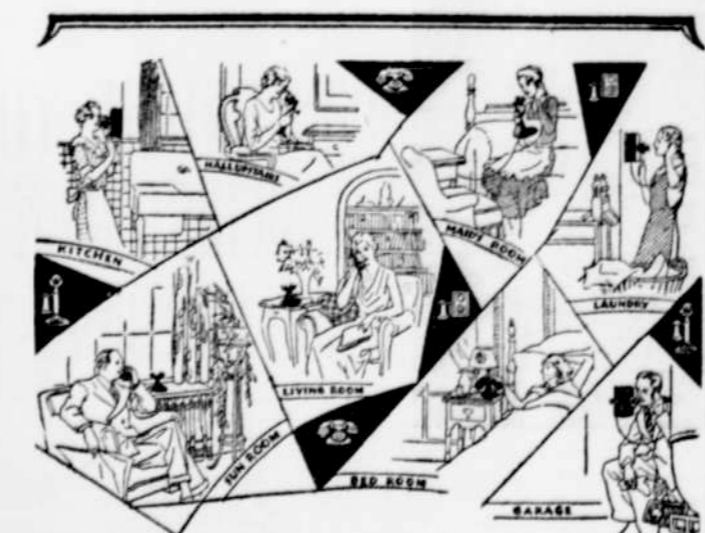
LONG RECORD PROVES COUNTY CLERK'S ABILITY

A. A. Bailey has been County clerk since January 7, 1929. In this short time he has accomplished much that should interest every taxpayer. Just as a comparison, the expenses of the main office in 1924 were \$110,577; in 1925, \$115,929; in 1926, \$115,097; in 1927, \$121,412; in 1928, \$122,652. In August 1928, the former clerk fixed the budget at \$134,537. These figures can all be found in the Reports of the Tax Conservation Commission for 1928 and 1929 in table 8. They show an almost constant increase in expense.

The cost of the election department for the same time was as follows: 1924, \$94,256; 1925, \$95,436; 1927, \$197,702; 1928, \$140,464.
 Under Mr. Bailey's supervision, the main office cost in 1929, \$133,727. Out of this was purchased and paid for the photostat recorder and equipment, new office furniture, repairs to books and installing new shelves, totaling about \$10,900. In 1930, the cost was \$115,854; in 1931, \$104,139. The budget for this year was fixed at \$107,768.
 The election of 1930 cost \$88,570, and this year the budget is \$87,525. Study these figures and compare them any way you wish and you will find a vast saving of money.

In addition to this, practically every attorney in Portland will tell you that never was there as good service in the Clerk's office as at present, and the courteous, pleasant treatment of all who patronize the office is most pronounced.
 Mr. Bailey has many more plans for improvement, most of which require legislative action to put in effect. If they are carried out they will result in savings to the citizens at least \$50,000 annually.
 Mr. Bailey is full of energy, a hard worker, and always on the job. In fact, he has not paid much attention to his political campaign, believing that the citizens would better appreciate his efforts on their behalf than to see him out telling the voters what he intends to do. He has kept every promise he made prior to his election.
